transaction of business. In the absence of a quorum any meeting may be adjourned from time to time. The delegates present at a duly called or held meeting may continue to do business until adjournment; notwithstanding the withdrawal of enough members to leave $1 e s s$ than a quorum. The president, or in his absence the vice president, or any other person designated from time to time by the Eoard of Directors; shail preside at all annual or special meetings.

Section b. TRANSACTION OF BUSINESS. EuSiness transacted at all special meetings shall be confined to the purposes stated in the call to the special meeting.

Section 7. DELEGATES: Each member endurance/ competitive trail ride shall submit the names of two official delegates or an authorized alternate delegate to be recorded by the corporate secretary prior to any meeting of members. The corporate officers; board members and rider representatives also will serve as delegates. However, while they may hold more than one of these positions at a time, they may only cast one votes Only delegates may vote on business presented at a meeting.

## ARTICLE III

EOAED OF DIRECTORS
Section 1. ELECTION OF DIRECTOFS: The property and business of this corporation shall be managed by its Board of Directors, which shail be composed of delegates, with the ExGEPtion of the Eoard position of veterinarian representetive which will be composed ot an endurance or competitive ride veterinarian= The Board shall not be less than three in number and not more than nine = The Board shail consist of a president, vice president, secretary/treasurer, immediate past president, and two members elected at iarge; or more as may be determined appropriate by majority vote of the Eqard, up to a maximum of four = There aIso shall be a Board position of veterinarian representative = Two directors wilh he elected each year for tho years or until his/her Successor shali have been elected at the annual meeting by majority vote of the attending delegates of the corporation= (Amended $2 / 1 / 86$ and $1 / 25 / 92$ ) Amendments itelics.

Section $2=$ VACANCIES. Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors may be filled by vote of a majority of the remaining directors or by election at a meeting of the corporation= A director elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for the unexpired term of his predecessor in office.

Section 3. MEETINGS AND NOTICE. The Board of Directors shall meet at least once each year immediately prior to the annual meeting of the corporation and at the same place as the annual meeting. No notice either to old or new members of the Board of Directors shall be required for
such annual meeting or for any regular meeting of the Directors fixed from time to time by resolution of a majority of the Board of Directors. Other meetings of the Board of Directors may be held upon three days written notice, upon the call of the president or other director. Notice may be waived in writing before or after the time of such meeting, and attendance of a Director at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice thereaf. Neither the business to be transacted at, nor the purpose of, any meeting need be specified in the notice of such meeting.

Section 4. Quofum. At all meetings of the Board, a majority of the Directors shall be necessary and sufficient to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and the act of a majority of the Directors present at any meeting at which there is a quorum shali be the act of the Board of Directors. Frovided, however; that if any vacancy (ies) exist for any reason, the remaining Directors shall constitute a quorum for the filling of such vacancy(ies).

Section 5. ORDER OF EUSINESS: The Eoard of Directors may from time to time determine the order of business at their meetings. The usual order of business at such meetings shall be as follows:
(1) The meeting is called to order by the president at the time and on the date of the meeting.
(2) Foll call --- quorum being present, the meeting proceeds with business.
(3) Reading by secretary of minutes of previous meeting and their consideration and approval.
(4) Report of officers.

Section 4. SALARIES. No member of any committee, office, or agent of the corporation shall receive a salary.

Section 5. FRESIDENT.
(a) The president shall be the chief executive officer of the corporation: she shall preside at all meetings of the members: s/he shall have general active management of the business of the corporationg and s/he shall $\equiv$ eee that all orders and resolutions of the Board are carried into effect.
(b) S/he shall execute all bonds, mortgages and other contracts.
(c) S/he shall be ex-officio a member of all standing committees; and shall have the general powers and duties of supervision and management usually vested in the office of president of a corporation.

Section 6 : VICE FRESIDENT: The vice president shall in the absence or disability of the president; perform the duties and exercise the powers of the president, and shall perform such other duties as the Board of Directors shall prescribe.

Section 7 . SECRETARY/TREASURER. The secretary/ treasurer shall attend all sessions of the Board of Directors and of all meetings of the members and record all votes and the minutes of all proceedings in a book kept for that purposes and shall perform like duties for the standing committees when required. S/he shall keep in safe custody the seal of the corporation, if any, and when authorized by the Board, affix the same to any instrument requiring it. 5 he shall have the custody of the corporate funds and securities and shall keep full and accurate account of receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the corporation and shall deposit all monies; and other valuable effects in the name and to the credit of the corporation, in such depositories as may be designated by the Eoard of Directors. S/he shall disburse the funds of the corporation as may be ordered by the Board; taking the proper vouchers for such disbursements, and shall render to the president and Directors, at the regular meetings of the Boards or whenever they may require it; an account of all her/his transactions as secretary/treasurer and of the financial condition of the corporation. S/he shall give the corporation a bond if required by a majority of the Eoard of Directors, in such amount as they may determine; and with one or more sureties satisfactory to the Boards for the faithful performance of the duties of her/his office, and for the restaration to the corporation in case of her/his death, resignation, retirement or removal from office, of all books, papers, vouchers, money and other property; of whatever kind in her/his possession or under her/his control belonging to the corporation. Costs of such a bond shall be borne by the corporation.

Section 7: NOTES OR BONDS. None of the officers of said corporation shall sign any notes or bonds for others without first securing the written consent of the other officers of the corporation=

Section 10. VACANCIES. If any office becomes vacant by reason of death; resignation, retirement, disqualification removal from office or otherwise, the directors then in office, although less than a quorum, by a majority vote, may choose a successor or successors, who shall hold office for the unexpired term of such office.

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Section 11= SEAL. The corporation shall have no seal
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Section 12. ALIDITING COMMITTEE: The president may, upon the affirmative action of the Board of Directors, designate two or more persons from the membership of the corporation to constitute an auditing committee whichs to the extent determined by the president, shall have and exercise the authority of the Board of Directors in the auditing of the accounts of the corporation and shall have full access to all books of the corporation in the possession of any of the officers of the corporation= The secretary/ treasurer shall submit her/his accounts to the auditing committee at any time at their request.

## ARTICLE VI

Section 1= INSFECTION OF BOOKS. Members shall be permitted to inspert the books of the corporation at all reasonable times.

Section 2. NEGOTIABLE INSTRUMENTS. All checks and notes of the corporation shall be signed by the secretary/ treasurer or the president or vice president or by such other officers or agents as may from time to time be designated by resolution of the Board of Directors. All expenses in excess of $\$ 2000$ shall be approved by a majority of the Board of Directors before being paid.

Sertion 3. FISCAL YEAR. The fiscal year of the corporation shall be from January 1 to December 31 each year.

Section 2. DUES. No endurance or competitive trail ride, individuals, or family shall become an active member of this organization unless or until it/s/he shall first pay to the corporation the annual dues which shall be set by the Board of Directors from time to time.

Sertion S. FIDEF REFRESENTATIVES. Individual members and family memberships of the corporation shall be entitled to vote for the four rider representatives who shall serve as delegates to the annual or special meetings of the corporation= Ride managers are not eligible to be selected as rider representatives. Family memberships shall be entitled to as many votess up to a maximum of two per family membership as there are adults within the family unit. (amended i/Si/Bク--amendment italic)

Section 4. VOTING FROCEDURES. Two delegates shall be chosen by each ride from the management of each ride and shall be considered and accredited as delegates at any meeting of the members of this corporation= Fider representatives, officers and members of the Board of Directors shali be considered and accredited as delegates also. Although one person may serve in a combination of the above positions, they may exercise only one vote as a delegate.

Said delegates shall elect the officers and Directors of the corporation and shalis by majority vote of the delegates present at any such meeting, approve rule changes proposed by the Board of Directors or decide whether to permanently adopt interim rules previously made by the Board of Directors.

Section 5. TEFMINATION OF MEMEERSHIF. The Board of Directors may by a majority of the entire board vote to terminate the membership of any member who has been shown to have conducted himself in a manner which is inconsistent with the goals and objectives of the organization. Thereafter such terminated member shall not be entitled to participate in any corporate functions or other corporate

We, the undersigned, of full age, for the purpose of forming a corporation under and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 317 of the Laws of the State of Minnesota, known as the Minnesota Non-Profit Corporation Act, do hereby associate ourselves as a body corporate and adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

## ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall he: UPPER MIDWEST ENDURANCE AND COMPETITIVE RIDES ASSOCIATION, INC.

## ARTICLE II

The purpose of this corporation shall be as follows:

1. To promote and develop good horsepersonship together with knowledge and interest in the care, training, use and breeding of good horses.

To take, receive, and acquire, in its own behalf, or as representative of others, by purchase, gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise, funds, real and personal property of whatever kind and wherever situated, and to hold, use, manage, lease, sell, convey, pledge, mortgage, improve, invest, or reinvest the same for the promotion of endurance and caompetitive trail riding within and without the state of Minnesota, which purposes shall be exclusively charitable within the meaning of Section 50l(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

## ARTICLE III

The corporation does not afford pecuniary gain incidentally or otherwise to its members. This organization was not organized for profit, and no part of the net earnings will inure to the benefit of any member.

A meeting of voting delegates of the Upper Midwest Endurance and Competitive Rides Association was held Sunday, December 7, at the Savings and Loan Building, Tomah, Wisconsin. Representatives were present from the following rides:; Iowa, Merrill, Kettle Moraine, S.E. Minnesota. The secretary's report was read and approved and an estimated treasurer's report was given.

The matter of trophies for the 1975 season was discussed, President Ralph Larson suggested than an alternative be found to the past system of giving trophies and ribbons for placings one through six, since this usually resulted in several ties. Bill McHenry moved to award trophies for champion and reserve plus placques for six placings, to make a top eight in all four divisions (endurance lightweight and heavyweight; competitive lightweight and heavyweight). Esther Schwartz moved to amend the motion to use the same system, but to have a top six for the endurance divisions and a top ten for the competitive divisions. Both the amendment and motion were carried.

The next point of discussion was whether to have points go to the horse and rider as a team or to have the points go to the horse regardless of who was the rider. Leonard Luloff moved to recommend to the annual meeting that the points be accumulated on horse and rider as a team. Etta Beecher seconded. Motion carried.

A suggestion was made that all rides combine their ride information and entry blanks to be sent out at one time as an Upper Midwest package, this booklet to include general ride rules. This would reduce the expense of printing and postage to each ride. It was also suggested that each ride might consider giving individually designed jacket patches as completion awards. Both of these proposals will be considered at the annual meeting.

The proposed set of competitive rules was discussed point by point and a copy of the suggested revision is attached to these minutes.

The annual meeting of the Upper Midwest Endurance Rides Association was held January 24, 1976, at the Heritage $H_{0}$ use, Madison, Wisconsin. Present were representatives from Merrill, Wisconsin Hoofbeats, Pillager, Kettle Moraine, Iowa, Neillsville, Minnesote Valley, Southeast Minnesota, and Palisades

The minutes from the 1975 Annual Meeting and the December board of directors meetings were read and approved. The treasurer's report, showing a balance on hand of $\$ 659.88$ was approved. (Copy of treasurer's report attached to these minutes)

Election of officers was $t$ he next order of business. Nominated for president were Ralph Larson, Lindsay Taliaferro and Don French. Lindsay Taliaferro was elected. Nominated for vice-president were Jim Svendse, Bob Beecher, and Ralph Larson. Dr. Beecher was elected. Nominated for secretary-treasurer were Esther Schwartz and Louise Riedel. Louise Riedel was elected.

The ride dates as listed in the minutes of the December meeting were accepted. The proposed competitive ride rules vere read. Les Sellnow moved to add the following to define the judging committee, "to be composed of all veterinarians and the trail judge." Dr. French seconded. Motion carried. Dr. French brought up the question of pads with shoes being allowed. According to the proposed rules pads are not prohibited, and if a ride wishes to prohibit them, this change must be approved by the executive committee. Lindsy Taliafferro moved to adopt the rules as amended, Les Sellnow seconded. Motion carried.

Les Sellnow brought up the problem of standardizing entry fees. He suggested a committee be formed to investigate this matter. $D_{r}$. French spoke to the point of each ride maintaining its own identity and using the rules as general guidelines rather than absolute standards. Esther Schwartz felt that fees should be the province of each ride depending on its expenses, services offered, etc. A discussion of veterinary fees followed. It was the concensus that the settlement of fees should be a matter between the ride and its veterinarians. It was pointed out that rides should attempt to keep entry fees as low as possible.

It was suggested that rules for the endurance rides should also be drawn up. No action was taken.

Dr. Beecher moved and Bill McHenry seconded that points for year-end awards be counted on horse and rider as a unit. Motion carried.

Skip Svendsen moved that a set of comprehensive guidelines for judging a ride be sent to each ride to be furnished to the ride's veterinarians. Motion seconded and carried. Bonnie Kaufman proposed that in order to serve as head vet at a ride, a person should have worked at least one or more rides as an assistant. It was pointed out that due to the shortage of interested veterinarians this would be hard to accomplish. Dr. French suggested that names of any new interested veterinarians be submitted to the board so they could be invited to observe a ride。

Ralph Larson announced the International Arabian Association's second annual national competitive ride will be held in Colorado on Labor Day weekend. The second International Endurance ride will be held in Red Bluff, California in August.

It was proposed that a packet including information on all Upper Mídwest rides be mailed to interested people. Bill McHenry moved that each ride submit to the secretary one sheet (both sides) describing their ride for inclusion in such a joint mailing. Les Sellnow seconded, Etta Beecher suggested including sufficient master entyr bianks so that riders could fill out a blank for any specific ride. The cost of this mailing would be assessed equally among the rides. The motion was tabled ard the rides will be rotified further as to costss and details.

The possibility of using jacket patches as completion awards was discussed. It was decided that this is the responsibility of each ride if they wish to do so.

The meeting was adjourned and was followed by a banquet and presentation of Upper Midwest and AERC awards.

## SANCTIONING

Buard of Directors
Rides are to be sanctioned by approval of the fxeeutive committoe at least three months beforeride.

Each sanctioned ride becomes a member of Upper Midwest and may have two voting delegates at any Upper Midwest meeting.

Initial fee is $\$ 20.00$ for first year plus $\$ 1.00$ per herse entered in ride.
Each year thereafter is $\$ 10.00$ plus $\$ 1.00$ per horse entered in ride.

## ADMINISTRATION

Each ride should have a Ride Committee composed of: Ride Chairman
Secretary
Official Timer
Head veterinarian
Trail Judge (optional)
(Judging committee to be composed of all veterinarians and the trail judge)
Each ride must be open to all breeds
25 mile ride.........horses must be a minimum of 4 years old
Over 25 miles........horses must be a minimum of 5 years old
Head Veterinarian and Trail Judge are subject to approval by Upper Midwest as experienced Competitive Ride Judges.

Ride must be open to everyone unless officially barred by Upper Midwest Executive cominter lluructos

Riders under 18 must have written permission of parent or guardian
Ride must be an accurately measured distance.
Ride must have a maximum and minimum time, $\frac{1}{2}$ hour differential
Maximum time about 6-8 miles per hour
Ride Committee may change this if trail and/or weather conditions warrant it. It is the ride committee's responsibility to inform each rider of any change -ither before ride or at the same point on trail.

Rid e must have at least two weight divisions (rider and tack) and awards given through six places. Those finishing ride but not placing should receive completion awards.
Heavyweight 180 lbs . and over
Lightweight under 180 lbs.
A pre-ride meeting shall be held to explain the ride and answer any questions.

Horsemanship will not be judged as part of horse's score. A separate horsemanship award may be given.

Each ride must publish the relative values placed on condition, time and manners (trail ability)

The riders must be informed as to what type judging will be used to determine manners (trail ability)

Obstacles not normally found on a trail are not to be used in trail judging and the horse is not to be asked to do anything an intelligent, welltrained horse would not do.
or the ride manager
No horse owned, part-owned or leased by a member of the judging committee/ shall be allowed to start the ride.

No judge shall qualify for a ride in which a member of his or her own
immediate family is participating. The ride manager or a member of his immediate
family may not participate
The decision of the judges will be final.

## RIDE RULES

Any type tack permissible
The same unit (horse, rider and equipment weight) must be maintained throughout ride

Any type shoes may be used (not required but recommended)
Boots or bandages above pasterns prohibited unless specifically allowed by ride committee.

Horses competing must not be under influence of drugs or stimulants and may be subject to drug analysis.

Unruly or ill mannered horses shall be excused from ride.
Horses will be ridden entire route, no forward motion unless mounted. Ride Committee may make exceptions in dangerous areas.

Each rider may have one person hold horse during saddling and at rest stop.
Riders must care for own horse unless ride committee determines that due to age or physical problems assistance is needed. The judges should be informed and the horse is not to be penalized.

On two day rides, rider may have assistance one hour after completion of first day's ride and until vet check next morning. The horse may be cared for during night, wrap legs, liniment, exercise, etc.

General rules of sanctioning and aministration of competitive rides apply
!. The first horse to finish in acceptable condition is the winner
2. There shall be an award for the best conditioned horse.
3. There can be ro minimum time limit
4. The ride must be controlled by veterinarians
5. Everyone finishing within the maximum time limit to be determined by the ride shall receive a completion award.
6. The ride is open to all breeds of horses.
7. The ride shall be a minimum of fifty miles in length.
8. Horses must be at least 5 years old. No mares in foal. Shoeing not mandatory but recommended
9. Horses must not be under the influence of drugs, medications or stimulants, and may be subject to drug analysis.
10. The same horse and rider must pass all control points in order and stay on the marked trail. If a horse for any reason leaves the marked trail he must resume the trail at that point of departure.
11. Any type tack is permissible. Weight divisions same as for competitive rides. Same horse, rider and weight that start must finish.
12. Unruly or unmannerly horses which are a hazard on the trail or a hazard to examine may be disqualified.
13. Horses must stand a pre-ride examination, all mandatory rest stop examinations as determined by the ride, and must pass a vet check after the ride (time to be set by the ride.) Any horse can be stopped at any point for a veterinary exam. The decision of the judges is final
14. Any inhumane treatment of horses may be cause for disqualification.

## MINUTES

A special meeting was held October 3 at the Horse Camping Area, Kettle Moraine State Forest. Rides represented were Minnesota Valley (Ruby Bartlett and Skip Svendsen); S.E. Minnesota (Marge Campion, Micallee Campion); Neillsville (Lindsay and Christine Taliaferro); Iowa (Louise Riedel, Bob Beecher); Mazomanie (Betty and John Bennett); Merrill (Mr \& Mrs Wayne Ringham); Kettle Moraine (Esther Schwartz, ); Quad Cities, (Bill Heck)

Bresident Lindsay Taliaferro explaine d that due to the continuing growth of Upper Midwest, it has become necessary to amend the By-laws and Articles of Incorporation to provide for a more realistic administration of $t$ he organization. The proposed changes are attached to these minutes and will be voted on at the annuảl meeting to be held January 15 in LaCrosse. Lindsay also announced that a committee of ride veterinarians under Dr. French, chairman, will consider such factors as ride standards, judging criteria and remuneration of veterinary judges, and will bring recommendations to the annual meeting. All rides were asked to provide names of veterinarians who have judged at their events.

It was decided to consider simplifying the name of the organization. Suggestions will be brought to the annual meeting.

## PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

## ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

ARTICLE I\#, Section 1. At present reads: "Membership in this organization shall be limited to active members only. Such active memberships shall be granted to all endurance ride corporations and/or individuals, persons who, on proper application, are approved by the Membership Committee and confirmed by a majority of the members present at a meeting of the club.

Proposed Amendment: Membership in this organization shall be limited to active members only. Such active membership shall be granted to all endurance and/or competitive rides which on proper application are approved by the Board of Directors. Each member ride agrees to abide by the rules and regulations established by the Association. The Board of Directors may adjudicate any infraction of such rule and take such action as it deems necessary.

## BY DAW'S

Article II. Section 1. TIME: At present reads: "An" annual meeting of the members, after the year 1972 shall be held on the first Sunday of December in each year, when they shall elect by a majority vote a Board of Directors.

Proposed Amendment: "An annual meeting of the members shall be held each year no more than 90 days after the last sanctioned ride. At this tine they shall elect by a majority vote a Board of Directors, which shall consist of a c president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, immediate past president and two members elected at large.

ARTICLE III, Section 2. Vacancies. At present reads: "Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors may be filled by the affirmative vote of a majority of the remaining Directors or by election at a meeting of members. A Director elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for the unexpired term of his predecessor in office.

Proposed Amendment: Delete "by the affirmative vote of a majority of the remaining Directors or"

Section 3. Meetings and Notice At present reads: "The Board of Directors shall meet each year immediately after the annual meeting......."

Proposed Amendment: The Board of Directors shall meet at least once each year immediately prior to the annual meeting......."

ARTICLE IV: OFFICERS. Section l. At present reads: "The Board of Directors at its first meeting and at its first meeting after each annual meeting of members shall elect a President from its own number, ard the Board ahall also annually elect a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer........

Proposed Amendment: "The members at the annual meeting shall by simple majority of those present, elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. The Secretary and Treasurer may be a combined office.

Section 3: At present reads: " The Officers of the Corporation shall hold office for one year or until their successors are chosen and qualify in their stead. Notwithstanding an earlier termiaation of their office as Birectors, any officer elected or appointed by the Board of Directors may be removed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors with or without cause."

Proposed Amendment: Delete the sentence beginning "Notwithstanding an earlier termination.......

The Upper Midwest Veterinary Committee met 12/19/76 at Chatfield, Minn. Present were Drs. French, Haupert, Schroeder and Beecher.

The following points were discussed and the following agreements were reached:

1. The use of a standard point system for evaluating competitive horses was decided upon. 'the parameters of $70 / 40$ will still be the basis for competition, but this system will allow the horses to be better judged at spot checks if they are above 70/40. The system is explained on an accompanying sheet.
2. It was decided that the lesions and dehydration will be recorded at the end of the ride by one man or by a committee. This will insure that all horses are equally judged and will not be double penalized for the same lesion or degree of dehydration at successive check points. This does not mean that these conditions will not be ehecked at each check point as a judgement to continue or not. The lesions and dehydration will be ecored on a standard form a nd added to the standard score on a percentage basis.
3. The ride (competitive) will be judged on the basis of at least three checks. Any other checks that are held may or not be used. This again will eliminate the human factor of grooms and time variances at the $\frac{i}{2}$-hour stop. The rule of one groom per horse is, in our opinion, flagrantly violated at this time and we do not intend to attempt to enforce this rule. The 70/40 parameter will still be enforced at the $\frac{1}{2}$-hour check point.
4. There will be a minimum of three checks per ride ( 25 miles )
5. If a horse passes the last veterinary check point on the established parameters and is capable of finishing the ride in the required time it is normally considered to be in acceptable condition. However the veterinary judging committee shall be the final determining factor in establishing an animal's acceptable condition.
6. The following guidelines and procedures are recommended for ride management: a. The ride committee shall provide a well-marked and accurately measured course. b. There shall be a ride manager, head secretary, veterinary secretaries, head timer and trail boss.
c. There shall be an adequate veterinary examination area.
d. Transportation shall be provided for necessary personnel movement.
e. Drag riders and/or radio crews ahall be available to monitor riders' movements. Pickup vehicles for horses shall be provided.
f. It is recommended that there be at least one veterinarian licensed in the ride's particular state.
g. Any deviation from Upper Midwest rules shall be advertised in an approved manner and also posted at the head secretary's area.
h. All pre-ride examinations should be completed one hour before ride time.

The pre-ride meeting should be $\frac{1}{2}$ hour before ride time.
i. The ride should have a posted starting time.
7. Veterinary duties are recognised as the following:
a. The ultimate duty of the veterinary comrattee is to insure the safety and heal of the horses entered in competition.
b. The veterinarians shal conduct pre-ride examinetions and examinations during the ride to provide that point 7a be insured.
8. Veterinary pre-ride examinations should consist of temperature, pulse and respiration checks, examination of all four feet and legs, mouth conjunctiva and oral membranes. Also locomotion checks in a straight line and figure eight and any other veterinary examination as may be required by the veterinary comittee, including under tack. Riders should have their horse prepared for the above examination. An unruly honse will not be judged.

Fees have been discussed at a previous meeting and we would refer Jpper Midwest to that meeting. An alternative might be the use of P\&R crews if they are properly trained. This should be cleared with the head veterinarian before they are instigated. At this time we would still recommend a minimum of two veterinarians per ride with Pbek crews.

The annual meeting of the Upper Midwest Endurance and Competitive Rides Association was held January 15 at the Ramada Inn, LaCrosse, Wisconsin. Lindsay Taliaferro presided. Ten rides were in attendance and were represented by the following delegates: Neillsville, Mr \& Mrs. Lindsay Taliaferro; Merrill, Wayne Ringham and Sheridan Schwark; Quad Cities, Steve Buddin and Alyce Carter; Kettle Moraine, Esther Schwartz and Sherry Howe; South Dakota, Dick Eurt and Tive yn Wiersma; Hoofbeats, Bonnie Kaufman and Virginia Rice; Minnesota Valley, Ruby Bartlett and Skip jvendsen; Iowa, Jr. R. A. Beecher and Leonard Luloff; S.E. Minnesota, Mr \& Mrs. Kalph Larson; and Falisades, Mr \& Mrs. Rick Nelson.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as circulated. The treasurer's report showed a balance January 24, 1976, of $\$ 659.88$; receipts of $\$ 771.00$; disbursements of $\$ 745.82$, leaving a balance Jan 15, 1977, of $\$ 686.06$.

The first order of business was adoption of the proposed amendments te the By-laws and Articles of Incorporation as set forth in the minutes of the special meeting of Uctober 3, 1976. The following action was taken: Amendment to Article IV, Section I of the "rticles of Incorporation was adopted; Amendment to Article II, Section 1 of the By-laws was adopted; Amendment to Article III, Section 2 was defeated; Amendment to Article III, Section 3 was adopted; amendments to Article IV, Sections 1 and 3 were adopted. Dick Burt moved to add the following to the By-Laws: Article II, Section 7. "Each ride shall submit the names of two official delegates, or an authorized alternate to be recorded by the secretary prior to a meeting." Rick Nelson seconded. The motion carried. Copies of the revised Articles and By-laws will be distributed to the rides.

There followed a consideration of the formal complaint with the Association lodged by Dr. Beecher as to whether or not the Palisades Ride committee should extend Dr. Beecher a completion award for the 25 -mile competitive ride held September 19, 1976. The president announced that he would state the facts as objectively as possible, two minutes each would be allowed the respective parties for remarks, and there would be five minutes for discussion from the floor, after which a vote of the membership would be taken. Specifically the dispute was in regard to the denial of a completion award for the 25 mile ride because a bridle per se was not used for the control of Dr. Beecher's horse. Following the president's resume of the case, statements from !r. Beecher and Rick Nelson who represented the ride, and questions from the floor, the president called for a vote. Fsther Schwartz moved that 'Dr. Beecher should be given a completion award by the Palisades ride committee for the September 19, 1976, 25-mile competitive trail ride. Leonard Luloff seconded. The motion carried. ( 15 affirmative, 2 negative, 2 abstentions)

Llection of officers was the next order of business. Nominated for president were Lindsay Taliaferro, Dr. Donald French, Jan Eorthington, Ruby Bartlett, and Dr. Jes Schroeder, who withdrew. Lindsay Taliaferro was elected. Nominated for vice-president were Ruby Bartlett, Ralph Larson and Dr. Beecher. Dr. Beecher was elected. Louise Riedel was nominated for secretary-treasurer and elected by acclamation. Nominated as members at large for the Board of Directors were Esther Schwartz, Ruby Bartlett, Dick Burt and Dr. French. Esther Schwartz and Ruby Bartlett were elected. The elected officers, two directors at large, and immediate past president, Ralph Larson, will comprise the Board of Directors.

Harriet Haenert was appointed by the president as Director of Pumlicity. Her job will include sending news releases to the various publications.

Lindsay intraduced Sam Arnold, president of AFRC, who will be guest of honor at the awards banquet and will present AFRC regional awards.

Lindsay briefly reviewed the current status of the Challenge Cup ride. A challenge has been issued by way of Saddle Action magazine to western riders to compete against our Midwestern riders in an endurance ride of at least 75 miles. If the challenge is accepted details of the ride would be worked out probably for 1978.

Representatives of three new rides wereintroduced; Jan Worthington, a 25 -mile competitive ride at holf Creek, Illinois; Cort Wilson, a 25 and 40 -mile competitive ride sponsored by the Concuistador Horseman's Association in the Chicago area; and John MacDonald, a 25 -mile competitive and 50mile endurance ride in the southern area of the Kettle Moraine.

The following schedule for the 1977 ride season was drawn up:


The ride brochure this year will include information on all sanctioned rides. Lach ride must submit its information to the secretary of Upper Midwest by March 15. (Up to two sides of $8 \times 11$ paper). Cost per ride will be prorated on the actual cost of printing and postage. Each ride is urged to include explicit directions to the ride site and a phone number where riders can be reached in an emergency.

Ur. Beecher presented the report of the Veterinary Committee, Dr. French, chairman. A copy of the committee's recommendations is attached to these minutes.

Under rule changes, Dr. Beecher moved that the rules prohibiting horses owned by a member of the judging comittee from entering a ride, and prohibiting members of the judging committee's family from participating in a ride be amended to include the ride manager. Motion seconded and carried. Skip Svendsen moved and Ruby Bartlett seconded that the above rules be deleted in entirety. Kotion defeated. The rules in question will read, "No horse owned, part-owned
or leased by a member of the judging committee or the ride manager shall be allowed to start the ride. No judge shall qualify for a ride in which a member of his or her own irmediate family is participating. A member of the immediate family of the ride manager may not participate.

Chris Taliaferro moved that the Milwaukee, Conquistador and Springfield (Wolf Creek) rides be sanctioned. Dick Burt seconded. Approved by the unanimous vote of the Board of Directors.

Rick Nelson moved that the time a rider is held up for 5 or more minutes at a spot check should not be considered part of ride time. Motion seconded and defeated.

Lindsay suggested that the Upper Midwest include a $4-\mathrm{H}$ division in all rides. Etta. Beecher suggested that it be a general junior rather than exclusively $4-\mathrm{H}$ division. Steve Buddin moved that a junior division (15 years of age as of January 1) be added to Upper Midwest rides, both competitive and endurance. Ruby Bartlett seconded. Mrs. Larson moved that this matter be tabled for further study. Kick Nelson seconded. Motion carried.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.


A banquet and awards presentation followed. Copy of 1976 ride standings is attached to these minutes

The Board of Directors of UMECR $F_{\text {met }}$ in Dubuque on December 3. Present were Ralph Larson, Dr. Beecher, Lindsay Taliaferro and Louise Riedel, the above members constituting a quorum.
a.) The president asked for a motion to support the Arabian International Competitive Championship ride which will be held in Dubuque in August. Upper Midwest will be asked not to schedule another ride for that date and to lend assistance in the management of the ride. Motion carried.

Arrangements have been completed for the annual meeting to be held in Rockford on January 14.
b.) Lindsay listed some of the problem areas that have arisen in UMECRA, i.e. surprise checks, $p / r$ procedures, trail marking, judging criteria, etc., and the resulting need to standardize procedures. The president asked the Board of Directors to propose to the annual meeting that UMECRA assign a steward to each member ride, this person to act as the official representative of UMECRA, assuring that the rules of the Association are observed, and assisting the ride in any way he can. The steward shall be remunerated at a rate set by the Bcard of Directors each year, funds to be paid by UNLECRA, which shall assess each ride for the proper amount. No immediate member of the steward's family or horse owned by the steward may compete in any division of a ride for which said person is acting in an official capacity. Motion carried.
c. A petjtion signed by 39 riders, plus 8 mail responses, was presented as follows: "Whereas there are a growing number of riders interested in the direction of UMECRA, the following persons hereby petition that an amendment providing for individual voting membership be prepared and circulated so that it can be voted on at the 1978 annual meeting." As a result it was moved that the following amendment be made to Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation:

## IV. Membership

Section 1: Membership in this organization shall be limited to active members only. Such active memberships shall be granted to individuals, to families, and to endurance or competitive rides-corporations.
a.) Individual memberships shall be open to individuals eighteen years of age and over.
b.) Family memberships shall be open to one or more related adults residing together. Such membership shall include the children of such adults who are less than eighteen years of age. Each family membership shall be entitied to as many votes up to a maximum of two, as there are adults within the family unit.
c.) Endurance and Competitive rides. Memberships shall be granted to all endurance and competitive rides which on proper application are approved by the Board of Directors.deEach member agrees to abide by the rules and regulations established by the Association. The Board of Directors may adjudicate any infraction of such rule and take such action as it deems necessary.

Section 2: No endurance or competitive rides corporation, individual, or family shall become an active member of this organization unless and until it shall first pay to the club the annual dues to be set by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. Two delegates chosen by each ride from that organtation shall be accredited voting members at antymeeting. Two delegates chosen at large by the individual and family members shall be accredited voting members at any meeting.

Also moved to amend the By-Laws as follows:
Article II, Section 2: TIME: An annual meeting of the members shall be held each year no more than 90 days after the last sanctioned iide. At this time the voting members as established in Article IV, Section 3 of the Articles of Incorporation, shall elect by a majority vote a Board of Directors from the list of voting members.

Article III, Section 1. Election of Directors: The property and business of this Corporation she.il bemanaged by its Eoard of Directors, which shall be composed of voting members, and which shall not be less than three (3) in number and not more than seven (7). The Board shall consist of a president, vicepresident, secretary, treasurer, immediate past president, and two members elected at large. They shall be elected at the annual meeting by majority vote of the voting members, and each Director shall be elected to serve for one year or until his successor shall have been elected and quaiffied.

Article IV. OFFICERS: Section 1. The voting members at the annual meeting shall by simple majority elect fromthe list of voting members: a President, Vicepresident, Secretary and Treasurer. The Secretary and Treasurer may be a combined office.

Motion to recommend the above amendments carried.
d.) It was moved and carried to recommend that annual dues be $\$ 5.00$ for an individual membership, $\$ 7.00$ for a family membership, and $\$ 10.00$ for a rice membership, except for the first year which will be $\$ 20.00$ per ride. A subscription to the Newsletter is to be received as part of the individual and family, membersinip. + hede membenthp.
e.) The question as to whether or not to require membership in UNECFA as a prerequisite for eligibility to receive year-end awards and rider mileage awards will be presented at the annual meeting.
f.) The following changes in Upper Midwest Ride Rules are recomended.
I. GENERAL Delete Rule No. 8 which reads "No horse owned, part-owned or leased by a member or the judging committee or the ride manager shall be allowed to start the ride. No judge shall qualify for a ride in which a member of his or her own immediate family is participating. The ride manager or a member of his inmediate family may not participate."

Fule \#12 shall be changed to read "Horses must stand a pre-ride examination, all. mandatory rest stop examinations, and must pass a vet check after the ride. Any horse can be stopped at any point for a veterinary exam. The decision of the judges is final.

Rule \#16 (to be added). "If a rider fails to complete the ride in the allotted time, management, may, at their discretion, give the rider a completion award, but that rider will not be placed in the standings, nor will he receive credit toward his rider mileage award."
II. COMPETITIVE RIDES.

Rule \#1. Shall be amended to read: " The ride must have a maximum and minimum time limit with $\frac{1}{2}$ hour differential recommended. The maximum riding time should average $6-8$ miles per hour. The ride committee may alter this if trail and/ or weather conditions warrant it. However any changes must be made and announced prior to the ride.

Rule.\#7. Shall be amended to read: "During the competition all riders are required to care for their own mounts except in the case-of a riok horse os having a horse held during a rest break. Other assistance in the care and grooming of mounts is prohibited . unless the ride committee determines that due to age or physical problems, assistance is needed.

Rule \#9. To be added: "Natural water only is allowed on the trail. Drinking water only is allowed at rest stops."

Rule \#10. To be added: "If Upper Midwest sanctions and advertises novice classes at a ride, all fees and rules shall be observed. A novice is a rider who has not participated in more than two rides (either competitive or endurance). Novice riders are not eligible for year-end awards Aer piden miteage.

Rule \#11. To be added: Multiple Day Rides
a. Horses shall all be tied in a similar manner after 9 p.m. until the next morning's vet check, and then retied until the checking of all horses is completed.
b. Horses will be subject to veterinary examinations after 9 p.m.
c. The evening's examination should involve attitude, dehydration, filling; sore backs and stocking up. The morning evaluation should include all of the above plus an evaluation for locomotion.

Rule \#12: To be added: Judging of Competitive Horses. Horses are evaluated on the following criteria: Soundness, condition and manners.
A. Soundness: To count $40 \%$.

1. Lameness and Stiffness: The judges shall evaluate 凡 Korse's way of going during the ride tc determine change in gait (lameness or stiffness) which is the result of an inability to adapt, to the stresses placed on tendons, muscles, ligaments, bones and joints.
2. Heat and Swelling: In the area of joints and tendons are of particular importance, indicating inflammation. Stocking, and swelling associated with the subcutaneous tissues need not be considered detrimental when founc.
after an overnight layover and which regresses shortly after resuming acitivit, However, when stocking occurs during the course of the ride or does not regress after resuming activity, it should be considered significant.
3. Muscular Soreness: With particular reference to the muscles of the back.
4. Saddle and Cinch Sores: Those which develop during the course of the ride or those previously present which progress.
B. Condition: To count $45 \%$
5. Evidence of fatigue and the inability to carry on. This should include an evaluation of depression, desire to eat and drink and diseases associated with exhaustion such as spasm, azoturia, colic and abnormal heart so unds.
6. Pulse and Respiration:
a. There will be a minimum of two pulse and respiration readings taken during each day's ride. T'ime held at "spot" checks will be included in the day's total riding time.
b. Not less than 10 minutes nor more than 15 minutes shall be allowed before the recovery pulse and respiration are taken. This information will be collected presisely and uniformly so as to aid the judges in making an evaluation of condition. $\mathrm{P} / \mathrm{R}$ 's may be taken by any judge and/or others who in the opinion of the judges are gualified to do so.
c. Pulse and respiation checks shall be taken for a minimum of 15 seconds.
d. The normal criteria for advancement is a pulse of 70 and a respiration of 40 .
e. A pre-ride pulse and respiration should be taken so that the judges can get acquainted with the horse. This recording would not he used as a reference point upon which to determine that a future reading is high or low.
f. Spot Checks. A 10-minute hold check shall be used. Riders may be advised of the approximate location. An assistant placed several hundred yards down the trail will tell the rider to trot from that point up to the judges. If the horses are badly bunched when they reach the assistant he will hold them and let them go at, 30-45 second intervals. Horses shall be checked for pulse and respiration 10 minutes after arrival.
C. Manners: To count $15 \%$. Consideration must be given to the manners of the horses on a ride. Poor manners decrease efficiency and ability to take the rider over the trail with a maximum of ease and safety. Throwing the head, fighting the bit, kicking, standing quietly for mounting, response to command and general type of ride the horse offers his rider should be considerect. The horse should stand quietly for any examination that the judge deems necessary. Unruly horses such as those difficult to be examined or judged are subject to removal from competition.

D. Examination Procedures: The judges should act together and discuss individual horses throughout the course of the ride. All judges will evaluate all horses on soundness, condition and manners. Final decision should be reached jointly. The standardized UMLCRA scorecard shall be used at each ride.
III. ENDURANCE RIDES.

Kule \#6: To be added. The normal cwiteria for advancement is a pulse of 70 and a respiration of 40 .

Rule \#2: To be amended: "There shall be an award for the best conditioned horse. Consideration shall be given to the time element in making this selection. The best conditioned horse should have been stressed comparably (as near as possible) to the winner, and still meet all criteria for soundness and condition.

Rule \#3: To be amended: "here can be no minimum time limit. The maximum should he 12 hours total on a 50 -mile ride and 24 hours total on a 100 -mile ride.
g.) It was moved and carried to recommend establishing a junior division on all competitive rides, the age to be 15 and under as of January 1. There will be year end awards for this division.
h.) It was moved and carried to reimburse Harriet Haenert for the cost of the remaining T-shirts with the provision that she continue to sell them.

have a better sign, and someone to point the way; Lindsay, you'll just have tc open your eyes and follow directions.)

Another problem was poor selection and inaccessability of vet checks. In one instance, some riders, through no fault of their own, completely overran a check, while others were sent to the correct one where the head vet was, held 10 minutes, then sent to another impromptu point and held an additional 30 minutes. Riders that came in later were sent out ahead. All this on an Endurance Ride! A possible solution to this last problem might be to restrict any crews from going into the difficult places, and hence freeing the access to the PR crews. We should all be able enough horsemen to care for our own animals as infrequently as this would be required.

Another, and probably the most glaring of difficulties as I see it, is in the area of vet checks on Endurance Rides. Specifically......... WHAT CONSTITUTES ACCEPTABLE CONSITION TO CONTINUE and THE LACK OF STANDARDIZATION FRCM ONE RIDE TO THE NEXT. Wepstensibly use the criteria of $70 / 40$ then disregard it, elevate it due to climatic conditions, or falsify the readings, so on paper no one goes over the max. On only one of the early rides were these pulse and respiration parameters adhered to, with the elimination of many at the first check. This brings to mind a relevant discussion I heard on a Best Conditior award. The first person felt it was unfair that the second should be considered as they weren't up with the front runners, but if the truth were known, and the $70 / 40$ limits a hard and fast rule, none of the leaders would have left the third vet check.. Lo and behold...the second person is now one of the leaders. So one one hand, you play the game, know your horse, you just might have all the leaders pulled in front of you, while on the other, you most likely will end up an hour behind the pack.

The last area of consternation of an Endurance Ridehas to be the most nebulous of all in the

The following is a letter from John and Marion MacDonald recapping the season:

As the lone season draws to a close, I think it's time to look back and reflect on what we liked and disliked in Competitive and Endurance riding as conducted here in the Upper Midwest. From the viewpoint of a member of ride management as well as an occasional competitor, these comments are not wholly mine, but represent complaints and ideas heard round the circuit during the year.

In respect to ride management-I feel, on the whole, they were well-conducted with only a few instances of apparent unpreparedness, i.e. handwritten vet check forms on scraps of paper. If we want to grow and encourage new riders to participate, it's mandatory that all aspects of the ride by management, including the veterinarians, be performed in a professional and knowledgeable manner. I include the veterinarians here, because there were instances on competitive rides that a complete lack of understanding of the importance of the $P \& R$ checks was demonstrated. A case in point, a very knowledgeable individual took the P\&R of his animal prior to taking him to the vet. The vet found the horse to be considerably higher, which in itself is no big deal, it has happened to all of us, but when the vet was asked to recheck it, the statement was made, "Don't worry, the horse is below $70 / 40$ and won't be held, that's all that matters." Another case is of the infamous 5 second pulse count, then multiplying by 10 to get a full minute's worth....and then arguing its validity. People pay good money for the right to torture themselves and demonstrate their masochistic tendencies, but in the end they do request an equal chance with their fellow riders. Winning or losing shouldn't depend on a chance draw.

The trails were well-marked in most instances, but where they weren't, it was disastrous to those who got lost. (Louise, next year I'll

The motion was made to accept the recommendation for changing Articles II, III, \& IV of the By-Laws. Motion carried 23.-1.

The motion was made and seconded to accept recommendation d. (concerning annual dues) Motion carried 22-2

Louise Riedel moved, John MacDonald moved to accept recommendation e. ( concerning membership as a prereguisite for eligibility for year-end awards) John MacDonald seconded. Motion passed 18-6. Tom Guy moved and Dr. Beecher seconded to amend the above motion as follows: that points will not be accrued until such time as either the membership application and dues are received by the secretary, or the date of postmark if send by mail. A cost estimate for the 1979 brochures was given. R.T. Guy offered to have the brochures printed at cost. This will enable UNECRA to put out the bulletin at the eame cost to each ride as last year. (\$20.00)

* It was clarified that voting delegates of rides are not rider members, and must pay dues for individual or family memberships in UMECRA in order to have points and rider mileage counted.

It was moved that the rider members of any given year shall elect their representatives for the following year at the annual meeting. Motion seconded and carried.

It was moved that a "reject" ride or any other type of "fun" ride shall not be considered a point-eligible ride. Motion seconded and carried.

A proposal was presented to have booths at the Arabian and Appaloosa national shows to promoted distance riding, with the possibility of involving other ride organizations such as AERC, ECTRA, etc. It was felt there were not enough funds at this time, but the subject will be further investigated.

'he Board of Directors met at the Hotel Julien, Dubuque, Iowa at 10 a.m., January 20. Present were Lindsay Taliaferro, John Mac Donald, R. A. Beecher, R. T. Guy, and Louise Riedel.

It was decided to add Rule $G$ to the Rules for Judging Competitive Horses "Rules affecting veterinary judging may be changed due to unusual ride conditions if deemed necessary by the head veterinarian and a UMECRA board member. To be added to Rule D "The standard UMECRA score sheet, time card and scoring system shall be used."

Insurance was discussed. Dr. Beecher will present a plan at the annual meeting. Dr. Beecher presented and explaiaed the proposed score sheets and time cards. It was moved and seconded that the new scoring system be implemented. Motion carried. They will be provided to the rides in packages of 300 cards and 50 score sheets for a cost of $\$ 10$.

It was decided to add the following to Rule B.2.f. "Although herses do not have to meet the $70 / 40$ criteria at spot checks, the veterinarian may hold a horse for longer examination. And to eliminate Rule $E$ (Scoring formula).

In light of the possibility of AERC changing the point system to award points according to the size of the ride, the following statement will be forwarded to AERC "The Board of Directors and members of UMECRA are unamimously opposed to the proposed AERC scoring system and strongly urge it be defeated."

Dear Ride Managers, Board Members, Rider Representatives:
Planning for the 1979 season is well under way. Following are the minutes of the annual meeting, the financial report, and the ride schedule for 1979.

Ride managers are reminded that dues and assessment for printing and mailing brochures are now payable. ( $\$ 40.00$ dues for old rides and $\$ 20$ for new ones; and \$20 for printing.)

AIso VERY IMPORTANT. Ride Sheets for the new brochure must be in the hands of the secretary by February 15. If a sheet has not been received by this time, we will use last year's sheet and alter the dates.

## MINUTES, ANNUAL MEETING Jan. 20, 1979

The annual meeting was held at the Julien Motor Inn, Dubuque, Iowa. Rides represented were Badger, Loud Thunder, Badger 2-Day, Wolf Creek, AHDRA, South Dakota, Neillsville, S.E. Minnesota; Underdown, Black Hills, Kettle Moraine, Paradise Valley, and Palisades, with 27 delegates eligible to vote.

Under old business the subject of insurance was discussed. Lindsay reported having contected the Rhulen Agency, but had not received a quatation as to price.

Dr. Beecher spoke about a new Arabian horse association (Arabian Horse Distance Riding Association - AHDRA), which is being formed. It will be affiliated with the International Arabian Horse Association, which group wouid furnish liability insurance for $\$ 150$ for an organization of fewer than 100 members, to cover 12 events per year. It might be possible to include other UMECRA rides under this insurance plan.

Dr. Beecher also announced the International Arabian Competitive Distance Ridigg award to be given to horses who have completed 500 miles and over.
Under new business, the Board has voted to establish a memorial award in honor of UMEGRA's first president, Ralph D. Larson, to be presented to the junior rider who accumulates the most points in both endurance and competitive riding.
The President then presented in the form of motions, the following recommendations of the Board:
1). That UNECRA establisf̂́ a junior competitive rider division (16 and under as of January 1). A $\$ 10$ or less entry fee shall be charged by the ride, with no $\$ 1.00$ fee due to UNECRA. At the end of the year a high point junior champion and reserve will be given. UMECRA will supply ribbon awards through sixth place to each ride with no charge to the ride. Any junior can compete in the open divisions by meeting the full weight and fee requirements. kotion carried.
2. That the following weight divisions be established for competitive rides: Lightweight - 145 pounds through 189 pounds. Heavyweight $\in 190$ pounds and over. Motion carried.
Lindsay presented the proposed scoring sheet and timer card, which will be required to be used on all compe itive rides. They will be supplied to all rides in bundles of 50 sheets and 300 cards at the price of $\$ 10$ per bundle. The Ride Management Manual will be revised to explain this new system.
The following proposed changes in the rules for judging competitive horses were presented in the form of motions by recommendation of the Board:

1. Eliminate the word "Recommendations" in No. 12 under Competitive Rides. To read "Judging of Competitive Horses)
2. Substitute the word punsoundness" for "lameness" in rule 12. A. 1. to read "Unsoundness and Stiffness".
3. Add rule 12.A.5. to read "A horse completing a ride jgidged to be clinically lame shall not be eligible for awards other than completion."
4. Rule B. 2. f. Reword to read! Spot Checks. A 10 -minute hold check shall be used. An assistant placed several hundred yards down the trail will tell the rider to trot from that point up to the judges. If the horses are badly bundhed when they reach the assistant, he aill held them and let them go at $30-45$ second intervals. Horses shall be checked for pulse and respiration 10 minutes after arrival. Although horses do not have to meet the 70/40 criteria at spot checks, the veterinarian mydy hold a horse for longer examiration.
5. Rule C. Manners. Eliminate the phrase "to count 15\%." Eliminate the sentence "Poor manners decrease efficiency and ability to take the rider over the trail with a maximum of ease and safety."
6. Rule D. Reword the last sentence to read"The standard UMECRA score sheet, time card, and scoring system shall te used"
7. Eliminate E. "Scoring System"
8. Add new rule E. "Rules affecting veterinary judging may be changed tue to unusual ride conditions if deemed necessary by the head veterinarian and a UNECRA board member."
All the above changes were voted upon and approved.
A discussion followed on a proposal presented by Dick Burt to the Board that UMECKA be sestructured to allow for two members on the Board from each state which has at least two rides, and for the officers to be elected from the Board by its members. Since this would require amendments to the Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws, it was suggested that such proposal should be prepared and presented as provided by the by-laws.

The question of establishing a permanent site for the annual meeting was discussed. Esther ${ }^{\text {Schwartz moved thata a straw vote of the people present }}$ be taken to advise the board as to whether Madison, Wisconsin, should be the permanent location for the annual meeting. Motion seconded and defeated.

Election of officers followed. Lindsay Taliaferro withdrew as a candidate for reelection as president. Nominated were Tom Guy, who declined, John MacDonald, Rick Nelson, and Dr. Beecher who declined. John MacDonald was elected.

Nominated for vice president were Jan Worthington, Dr. Beecker and Rick Nelson. Dr. Beecher was elected.

Louise Riedel was nominated and elected for secretary-treasurer.

The question of expanding the territory of UMECRA with the possibility of regional divisions was discussed．There has been some interest indicated from rides in Ohio and Michigan．Louise Riedel and Dr。Beecher were appointed to act as a committee to approsch the people from this area，explaining our program and requirements，to determine the extent of their interest．If they respond affirmatively a board meeting will be called at the Palisades Ride．

The board voted to set Madison Wisconsin as the site for the annual meeting．Dianne and Bonnie were appointed to choose year－end awards．

John MacDonald recommended that rides be required to pay dues and their share of the cost of the brochures，as well as to maxichave their requests for ride dates in at the time of the annual meeting．

A Board of Directors meeting was held December 1 at 1:00 p.m. at the home of Dr. R.A. Beecher, Cascade Iowa. Present were John MacDonald, Dr. Beecher, Rick Nelson, Louise Riedel, Christine Taliaferro (acting for Lindsay), and rider representatives Dianne Whitcomb and Bonnie Kaufman (without vote)

There was no old business. Louise Riedel presented a comparison of ride attendance of 1978 and 1979, showing 20 fewer entries overall in '79+

John MacDonald stated that all rides should be asked to reserve their 1980 date and to notify us prior to the banquet.

The "elevator ride" concept was discussed. It will be considered at the annual meeting.

Rick Nelson moved that each ride weekend will constitute a ride membership, and will require payment of dues, brochure prorata cost and rider fees. (For example the Badger Rides and the Badger two-day Sixty will each pay $\$ 10$ dues plus the pro-rata share of the brochure, plus rider fees) Dr. Beecher seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. Beecher moved that several critique sheets be included in the brochure, giving riders an opportunity to comment favorably or unfavorably on any given ride. Rick Nelson will design such a form and be responsible for receiving them. Motion seconded and carried.

Rick Nelson moved to institute a system for protests. A protest must concern an infraction of the rules, must be received in writing within 7 days of the ride, and must be accompanied by a fee of $\$ 25$. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned to the complainant. The protest will be sent to the UMECRA president and will be adjudicated at the next boaved meeting.

The Ride Manager's Manual and Veterinary Guidelines booklet will be revised to include all UMECRA rules plus more specific instructions for using the scoring system. Dr. Beecher is handling this project.

Harriet Haenert has resigned as Newsletter editor. Dianne Whitcomb volunteered to act as the new editor.

It was suggested that the veterinarians who officiated at rides during the 1979 season be invited to attend the annual meeting. Since a complete list of addresses is not available, each ride will be asked to contact at least the head veterinarian. All will be welcome, and a veterinarian's forum will be held if enough are in attendance.

The meeting was adjourned.

 La Raindrops - Lindsay TaliaferroA Board of Directors meeting was held prior to the annual meeting at the Holiday Inn in Madison. Present were John MacDonald, president, Dr. Beecher, Louise Riedel, Lindsay Taliaferro, R.T. Guy and rider representative Dianne Whitcomb.

The treasurer's report was presented. (See attached sheet). Dr. Beecher moved and Lindsay seconded the motion to accept.

John announced that the Appaloosa Horse Club has requested that the rides collect $\$ 1.00$ for each appaloosa competing. John replied objecting to this pland and stating that this should not be the responsibility the ride. The AHC has replied stating that the responsibility will be on the rider.

The Wisconsin State Horse Council is putting on a Midwestern Horse Fair on April $2 \dot{8}$ and 27 in Madison in coordination with a professional management organization. The fee of $\$ 150$ includes a booth, three stalls and a certain amount of arena time for demonstrations. Numerous breeds, commercial exhibitors and organizations will be represented. Dr. Beecher suggested that if UMECRA decides to participate, AHDRA might share expenses. Lindsay moved to participate in this project and to appropriate funds necessary for rental and operation of the booth subject to board approval. Motion seconded and carried.

The suggestion was made that UMECRA have its own duplicating machine. No action will be taken at this time.

Louise suggested that instead of having ride payments broken down into several categories (dues, printing costs, ride form costs), a lump payment be required to cover everything. Lindsay moved to set the fee at $\$ 40$, which will include all the above items, with a $\$ 10$ surcharge for new rides. Motion seconded and carried.

The next item of business was consideration of the recommendations which had been sent in to be included in the agenda of the annual meeting.
> 1. Completion awards and trophies for the junior competitive division. Diane Whitcomb will present this at the annual meeting.
> 2. Standardizing weight divisions to eliminate the discrepancies between endurance and competitive divisions as well as AERC. It was the concensus that no action can be taken until it is ascertained whether AERC will retain weight divisions.
> 3. Eligibility of rides for 1000 mile program. The board agreed that mileage in this progsam must be earned on UMECRA rides.
> 4. Meximum time for endurance rides.
> 5. A junior division for endurance rides. The board went on record as being favorable to this proposal
> 6. A "stress" division for competitive rides.
> 7. Publication of scores for competitive rides. Lindsay moved and Rick seconded that ride managemnat shall announce the point scores of entries during the awards presentation
> 8. Elevator ride concept
> 9. Critique forms.

The meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon.

## ANNUAL MEETING. 1980

The annual meeting convened at 1:00 p.m. Representatives from the following rides were present: St. Jude's, Badger, Wolf Creek, Loud Thunder, Widerdown, AHDRA, Southeast Minnesota, Northeast South Dakota, Neillsville, Namekagon, Palisades, Black Hills, Kettle Moraine, Wisconsin Hoofbeats, and Quad Cities Arab Club. Thirty-three were eligible to vote, including the two rider representatives.

In his opening remarks John MacDonald stressed the importance of promptness in reporting ride resuits and in payment of assessments. He also reported on the communication from the Appaloosa Horse Club (see board minutes), and stated that no report fooms had been received by the rides from the appaloosa club. As a result it is doubtfull if any appy owners will receive credit for rides completed.

Two new rides have applied for sanctioning--Brookings Saddle Club, and the South Dakota Arab Association. Lindsay moved and Dr. Beecher seconded the motion to approve these rides. Motion carried.

The minutes of last year's annual meeting were approved as circulated. The treasurer'r report as presented was approved (see attached sheet).

John MacDonald explained the concept of the Midwest Horse Fair to be held in Madison April 26, 27. UMECRA participation was approved by the Board of Directors. (See minutes of board meeting)

The president outlined a proposed budget covering finances relative to printing, dues and ride supplies. The board recommends that a total payment will be $\$ 40$ plus a $\$ 10$ surtax for new rides ( $T 0$ take the place of the double first year dues). If one organization puts on more than one ride, the payment is due for each ride. The $\$ 40$ payment will cover vet sheets and rider cards to supply 50 riders. If a ride needs extra forms they must order same and will be charged at cost. Dr. French moved and Rick seconded to adopt this proposal. Motion carried.

Next to be considered were items that had been presented to the board to be included in the agenda.

Dianne Whitcomb stated that she felt that juniors should receive both a first place trophy and a completion award. Dick Burt moved and Jan Worthington seconded that each ride shall give at least a first place award (in addition to the ribbons supplied by UMECRA), and that each junior who finishes shall receive a completion award. Motion carried.

It was recommended that weight divisions be standardized between endurance, competitive and AERC. This item will be tabled until it is ascertained whether AERC will retain weight divisions.

At this point Rick Nelson suggested that the UMECRA membership give some direction to the AERC delegates as to our feelings on issues to come up at the AERC convention. The floor was thrown apen to discussion on the following topics: weight divisions, best condition, point per mile bonus, junior division, points given depending on size of ride, elevator rides and rides over 100 miles. No official action was taken on any of the subjects.

John explained the action taken by the board requiring that mileage in the 1000 -mile horse program must be earned on UMECRA sponsored rides, novice and $4-\mathrm{H}$ rides to count.

Dr . Beecher expressed the opinion that it is important to give endurance riders adequate time to complete, He moved that the maximum total elapsed time for a 50 -mile ride should be 12 hours. Rick Nelson seconded. Motion carried.

Dick Burt moved that we institute a junior endurance division with the entry fee to be set by the ride. The age to be the same as AERC. Juniors may not ride in another division, but may receive the overall award if one is given, and may receive best condition; UMECRA will furnish the ribbons. Jan Worthington seconded. Motion carried.

Lindsay Taliaferro presented the concept of a "stress division" for competitive rides, whereby riders who wished for more of a challenge could ride under conditions where the time of the regular ride would be shortened and extra points would be awarded ( $50 \%$ more). These riders woild receive a jackpptted amount rather than the regular trophies. After lengthy discussion Dr. Beecher moved that UMECRA give permission to a ride to give $50 \%$ extra points if it wishes to include a stress division. Lindsay seconded. The motion failed.

John MacDoneld then moved that a"stress group" (not a separate division) may be 100 l luded : by a ride at its discretion. A rider entering must complete the ride in a shorter time than that of the regular established time. These riders will then receive $50 \%$ more points for any placing they may receive. These riders will ride under all other rules, regulations and weight divisions. Rick Nelson seconded. Motion carried. the
It was recommended by several riders that harsestes point scores on a competitive ride be announced at the same time placings are announced. Johr MacDonald moved that the rides follow this procedure. Jan Worthirgton seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. French moved and Rick Nelson seconded that UMECRA shall not approve elevator rides. Motion carried.

A sample "critique" sheet which will enable riders to rate the rides and/or comment favorably or unfavorably was presented. Rick Nelson moved and $\mathrm{D}_{\mathrm{r}}$. Beecher seconded that several such sheets be included in the 1980 ride brochure, with completed sheets to be returned to Rick. Motion carried.

A system of filing protests had been proposed at the December boatd meeting. Rick Nelson moved and Jan Worthington seconded that a protest must concern an infraction of the rules, must be received in writing within 7 days of the ride, and must be accompanied by a fee of \$25. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned to the complainant. The protest will be sent to the UMECRA president and will be adjudicated at the next board meeting. Gail Bonnicksen proposed an amendment to the effect that the complainant should first bring the matter to the attention of ride management at the time of the infraction. The amendment was seconded and carried. The original motion as amended was carried.

John announced that Diane Whitcomb will be the new Newsletter editor. The Board of Directors goes on record as thanking Harriet Haenert for all her past services as editor.

Dr. Beecher, president of the Arabian Horse Distance Riding Association, announced the annual meeting of this group to be held Sunday, January 13 at this same location. He stated that Arabian horses can now earn Legion of Honor without halter points and that a system has been devised to give points toward this award for endurance and competitive horses. The insurance ruling from the International Arabian Horse Association was clarified. Twelve events can be sanctioned under AHDRA's insurance coverage. If other UMECRA rides are interested in obtaining this coverage the statement must appear in the ride sheet that the ride is "co-sponsored with AHDRA", and one member of management must be a member of AHDRA.

John MacDonald pointed out that there have beem probin. mileages on some rides, and that ride mileage must be an accurately measured distance. He also pointed out that considering the current gasoline situation it will be extremely important for rides to promote local participation in their areas.

The next item of business was election of officers and board members. John MacDonald was nominated for president; $\mathrm{Dr}_{\mathrm{r}}$. French moved and Rick Nelson seconded that nominations be closed. Dr. Beecher and Norman Cooper were nominated for vice-president. Norman declined. Dr. French moved and Rick Nelsr
seconded that nominations be closed. Louise Riedel was nominated for secretary treasurer. Dr. French moved to close nominations. Rick seconded. The above motions were carried and the candidates elected. Nominated for board members were Ted Cooper, Dick Burt, Rick Nelson, Tom Guy, and Jan Worthington. Elected were Ted Cooper and Rick Nelson.

Rider representatives will be elected following the meeting.
It was moved to adjourn.

The UMECRA Board of Directors met in Dubuque on December 6. Those present were John MacDonald, Lindsay Taliaferro, Dr. Beecher, Ted Cooper, Rick Nelson and Louise Riedel; also rider representatives Bonnie Kaufman and Dianne Whitcomb.

John MacDonald reviewed some actions that had been taken since the last board meeting. Two additional rides were sanctioned after the schedule was made up. The total expenses of the Horse Fair in Madison last April were $\$ 309.03$. AHDRA has not reimbursed UMECRA for its share as decided upon at the last board meeting. Dr. Beecher will check with the AHDRA treasurer. Offers to donate "rookie of the year" trophies have been received from Hugh Miller and Mr. and Mrs. Paul Birkholz. The latter donors wish to give a travelling tropht in memory of Bill Svoboda.

The Horse Fair for 1981 was discussed. John recommended that we not participate this year. Ray Antoniewics of the $U$. of Wisconsin will sponsor a distance riding clinic again this year during the first part of April, and it was the feeling that this would be more valuable for our purposes. John will contact Ray relative to setting up a UMECRA booth and display at this seminar and to coordinate our advertising along with that for the clinic.

Dr . Beecher pointed out that ride veterinarians should be hired with the understanding that they should be capable and prepared to take care of emergencies that may arise necessitating treatment of horses.

Lindsay Taliaferro moved that UMECRA require that a veterinary acknowledgement form*be submitted to the HMECRA secretary 60 days prior to the ride date. Failuive to do so will result in loss of sanctioning and notification of same in the Newsletter. Rick Nelson seconded. Motion carried unanimously and will be presented at the annual meeting.
*( The veterinary acknowledgement form will be written by the UMECRA veterinary committee and provided with the ride packet. The form will insure that the ride veterinarian is made aware of and understands his responsibilities)

The importance of riders sending entry forms in advance was discussed. A possibility of requiring a post-entry fee was suggested, No action was taken.

Rick Nelson moved that the competitive weight division be changed to coincide with endurance at 160 pounds without tack, and to eliminate the minimum wieght requirement for lightweights. Rider will declare hie weight at the first ride he enters. Motion seconded and carried 5 to 1.

Dr. Beecher moved that we use jackets as year-end awards. Dianne will handle this. If jackets are not available Ted and Marie Cooper will arrange for another type award. Lindsay seconded. Motion carried.

The secretary announced that an error had been made in heavyweight endurance standings. Mike Kreiner should have been listed as champion and Bob Mielke reserve.

Dr. Beecher moved that UMECRA donate 10 foam saddle pads for the AERC raffle. Motion seconded and carried.

Rick Nelson moved that the age of junior riders be changed to read "not 16 by January 1 of each year". (This will coincide with AERC requirements for junior endurance riders). Motion seconded and carried.

It wasmoved, seconded and carried to change rule II. 7. to read "Boots or bandages are prohibited. "Easy Boots" are considered a type of shoe."

Dr. Beecher moved that the following rule be added: "Rest stops on both endurance and competitive rides must be a minimum of $\frac{1}{2}$ hour." Lindsay se onded. Motion carried.

Dr. Beecher moved that Rule I. 14. be changed to read. "If a rider fails to complete the ride in the allotted time, management may, at their discretion, give the rider a completion award, but that rider will not be placed in the standings; however he will receive credit toward his mileage award." Motion seconded and carried.

It was decided that copies of the critique sheets, with names of writer deleted, be sent to the pertinent rides, and that Rick prepare a synopsis of criticisms, suggestions and comendations to be read at the meeting.

Lindsay moved that the Jubilee ride be placed on probation for one year for reasons of non-compliance with UNECRA rules as set forth below:

1. Changing the time of the endurance ride to 7 hours
2. Failure to check some endurance horses at the end.
3. Having a 5 minute spot check on the competitive ride.
4. Placement of a horse that did not complete in the allotted time on the competitive ride.

Failure to comply with all UMECRA rules in 1981 may lead to non-sanctioning. Rick seconded. Motion carried.

Lindsay moved that the board recommend that end of the year competitive awards, using the same point system, be based upon the top five scores achieved by the riders, ties to be broken by taking into account the next best rides. Beecher seconded. Motion failed to carry.

Rick Nelson moved that in the case of a tie score in a competitive ride, the tie will not be broken (i.e.) 1st, 1st, 3d, 4th, 5th, 6th). Lindsay seconded. Motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned.

## Dear Ride Managers, Board Members, Rider Representatives;

Plans for the 1981 season are well under way. Inclosed are the minutes of the board and annual meetings, the financial report and the ride schedule for 1981. The annual meeting held in LaCrosse last weekend was a real success with approximately 125 people attending.

A few of the highlights:

- Five new rides were approved
- Weight divisions in both competitive and endurance were returned to 180 pounds with tack.
- An alternative scoring system for year end awards using the best 125 miles for competitive and 250 miles for endurance is being developed on a one-year trial basis. This will not replace the present system.
- Rides will be required to insure that the head veterinarian receives a copy of the UMECRA Veterinary Guidelines handbook and returns a signed satement to the UNECRA secretary.

ALSO VERY IMPORTANT: Ride sheets for the new brochure must be in in the hands of the secretary by February 15. If a sheet has not been received by this time we will use last year's sheet and alter the dates.

RIDE SANCTIONING FEES are due NOW! For established rides the fee is $\$ 40$ which again includes dues, all necessary forms and the ride's share of the brochure. There is a surcharge of $\$ 10$ for new rides.

Rides are also reminded that it is your responsibility to contact AERC directly for endurance sanctioning.


Present were MacDonald, Taliaferro, Beecher, Riedel and Cooper. Also rider representatives Kaufman and Whitcomb.

It was pointed out that supporting the junior divisions cost UNECRA approximately $\$ 500$ in 1980 (including lost rider fees and ribbons at \$425). Dr. Beecher moved that we continue to support the junior divisions by furnishing ribbons, but that the rides again be assessed $\$ 1.00$ per junior rider. The junior entry fee shall still be no more than $\$ 10$ based on a 25 -mile ride) and rides shall furnish a junior division trophy. Lindsay seconded. Motion carried. It will be presented at the annual meeting.

Weight divisions were discussed. It was decided to present the motion passed at the December 6 board meeting providing for the competitive weight to be 160 pounds without tack.

The subject of using the "best five rides" to determine year-end awards was discussed. Dianne Whitcomb had prepared a statistical study showing how the season was broken down according to frequency of attendance. It was decided to present a proposal that in addition to the present award system we establish a derby based on the combined mileage of 125 miles, competitive, and 250 miles endurance, the entry fee to be $\$ 10$ per horse. End of year awards will be given based on UMECFA rules and points, with the board of directors to establish bookkeeping procedures and to purchase awards.

Dr. Beeker moved to approve the following rides. Lindsay seconded and motion carried: Sunset Valley, Combo, Valhalla, Glacier Trails and Governor Dodge. Camp Courage had been approved at the December board meeting.

## ANNUAL MEETING

Present were representatives from the following rides: Badger, St. Jude, Wolf Creek, Glacier Trails, AHDRA I \& II, ApDRA, Neillsville, SE Minnesota, NE South Dakota, Minnesota River Valley, Namekagon, Marquette County, Grand Island, Palisades, Kettle Moraine, Camp Courage, Valhalla, and Governor Dodge.

The treasurer's report was read and approved. See attached copy.
The motion concerning junior division fees as proposed by the Board of Directors (see above minutes) was carried.

A discussion followed concerning the function of ride veterinarians. It was the concensus that they should be hired with the understanding that they should be capable and prepared to take care of emergencies that may arise necessitating treatment of horses. At the December 6 board meeting a motion was passed requiring that a veterinary acknowledgement form be submitted to the UMECRA secretary 60 days prior to the ride date. Failure to do so will result in loss of sanctioning and notification of same in the Newsletter. The veterinary acknowledgement form will be written by the UMECRA veterinary committee and provided with the ride packet. The form will insure that the ride veterinarian is made aware of and understands his responsibilities. There being no objection the motion was accepted \&s it stands.

At the December Board meeting a policy was instituted to the effect that "rest stops on both endurance and competitive rides must be a minimum of $\frac{1}{2}$ hour. " In this context Dr Beecher moved that if a ride wishes to use the "stop and go" concept the board should be contacted for approval and the establishment of procedures. The board's action and rules will be publicized in the Newsletter in adequate time to notify riders. Motion seconded and carried.

Skip Svendsen moved that rides charge a $\$ 2.00$ post entry fee to encourage riders to enter in advance. Etta Beecher seconded. Motion failed to carry.

* Lindsay Taliaferro moved that in addition to the present award system we establish a"derby"based on the combined best mileage of 125 miles, competitive, and 250 miles endurance, the entry fee to be $\$ 10$ per horse. End of year awards will be given based on UMECRA rules and points, with the board of directors to establish bookkeeping procedures and to purchase awards. Motion seconded and carried.

Ted Cooper moved that weight divisions in both competitive and endurance go back to 180 pounds with tack, with the minimum weight requirement of 145 pounds in competitive to be eliminated. Juniors who pay the full fee may ride in the open division of competitive rides. Motion seconded and carried 20-13.

The following were nominated for rider representatives: Sandi Thomas, JoAnne Gernant, Dianne Whitcomb, Bonnie Kaufman, R.T. Guy, and Mary Ruckwardt, voting to be done at the close of the meeting.

Nominated for president were John MacDonald and Lindsay Taliaferro who declined. Nominated for vice-president was Dr. R.A. Beecher and for secretary treasurer, $L_{0}$ uise Riedel. All three were elected by unanimous ballot. Nominated for directors were Hugh Miller, Ted Cooper, Rick Nelson, Wanda Van Meir and Dick Burt. Ted Cooper and Rick Nelson were elected.

Meeting adjourned.

J It was unanimously agreed to uphold the protest of Chris Kahnke concerning the Brookings competitive ride in which a tie was broken in violation of UMECRA rules. Chris Kahnke will be recorded as sharing in a three-way tie for first place in the lightweight division, and will be awarded 7 points.

Sites for the 1982 annual meeting were discussed and it was decided to investigate the possibility of holding the meeting at the Wisconsin Dells. John MacDonald will follow up on this. The secretary was instructed to write a letter to the rider representatives outlining the requirements for year-end awards, with up to $\$ 1000$ allocated for this purpose. This will includer the awards based on the best 125 comp= etitive and best 250 endurance miles.

The UNECFA Board of Directors met December 12 at Johr. MacDonald's. Present were John, Dr. Beecher, Louise Riedel, Ted Cooper, Rick Nelson, Lindsay Taliaferro, and ride rep= resentatives JoAnne Gernant and Tom Guy.

John reviewed the two protests that occurred during the year. A protest over the improper breaking of a tie at the Brookings Ride was upheld. A protest concerning horses finishing late at the Camp Courage ride was denied.

Dr. Beecher moved and lindsay seconded that the Merrill Ride be put on probation for one year based on the fact that the rule was violated which states "Ride management may make alterations if time and/or weather conditions warrant it. However any changes must be made and announced prior to the ride." In the case of the Merrill Ride the time was extended to cover the second spot check; however this was not announced until after this spot check and not all riders were so notified. Motion carried.

Lindsay moved to commend the Jubilee Ride on an excellent job of conducting and managing their 1981 ride, and to inform the ride that it has been removed from probation. Rick seconded. Motion carried.

Ted Cooper moved and Rick seconded that sanctioning of the Black Hills Ride be withdrawn due to non-payment of sanctioning and rider fees and a bill for printing, and failure to send ride results. Motion carried.

Dr. Beecher moved and Rick Nelson seconded that the Pillager and Wolf Creek rides be placed on probation for one year due to failure to submit rider fees and ride results. (Rule III A). Failure to comply will lead to withdrawal or sanctioning. Motion carried.

Rick Nelson moved and Ted seconded that we disallow anyone from receiving year end awards, points, or mileage accumulation if they have outstanding debts to UNECRA or UNECRA rides to be effective December 11, 1981. Motion carried.

The following recommendations from ride managers and members were considered:

1) Bonnie Kaufman recommended that a JMECRA championship ride be held towerd the end of the season for horses that have won at least one endurance ride--to be held in conjunction with a regular ride. The concensus of the board was that we not consider this since it would not be a valid test, and the year-end awards are a reasonable proof of the championship.
2) Gordy Sussman proposed that UNECRA work with the Wisconsin DNR in planning horse facilities and that UMECRA go on record as supporting a head-tax on horsek. John explained that the Wisconsin Herse Council is working on both issues quite successfully and is in a better position as a state organization to meet the problem, whwreas UMECRA is a multi-state organization.
3) Judy Schlink of the sunset Valley ride proposed sanctioning a combination endurancecompetitive ride. The board showed interest in the concept, but felt it is not possible to fit it into either the endurance or competitive category for rule and ecoring purposes. At this point it is impractical to add a third category. It will be discussed at the annual meeting.
4) Judy Schlink also prpposed the "window" concept for competitive rides under which riders wiilld be required to finish within a 10 -minute period, outside of which there would be penalty points deducted for minutes late or early, rather than disqualification. This topic will be discussed at the annual meeting.

Lindsay réviewed the "derby" system of year-end awards and compared winners under both the regular and derby systems. He moved to continue the derby program for one more year to furnish a more valid basis for comparison. Ted seconded. Motion passed.

The following changes in the rules were discussed and recommended:
I. General:

Add: (following rule 4) "There must be a marker two miles from the finish line."
Add: (following rule 14.) "Any horse requiring medication for any physiological reasons before leaving the grounds will be disqualified. (Physiological reasons to include colic, fatigue, tying up, thumps, etc.) Any medication administered on the grounds must be under the supervision of the veterinarians.
Add. (following rule 20) "Anyone having outstanding debts to UNECRA or a UNECRA ride will be disallowed from receiving peints, year-end awards or mileage accumulation."
Add. (following the above). "The normal criteria for advancement is 72/40." (pulse parameter to be changed from 70 to 72 wherever mentioned.
II. Competitive Rides.

Add. (to rule 8) "Forward motion must be maintained the last two miles."
Add. (following rule 11.) "No ice, linaments or braces may be used before the final vet check."
Add. (following the above) "There must be a minimum of one rest stop per 25 miles or increment thereof"
Add. (to 14 A 2$) \mathrm{b}$ ) $\mathrm{PP} / \mathrm{r}^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$ shall be taken for a minimum of 15 seconds and recorded as actual during the recording period."
Delete. ( 14 A 2)c) which reads "The normal criteria for advancement is a pulse of 70 and a respiration of 40.1 This was transfered to the General rules aivove.
Change. ( 14 A 2 )e) That portion which reads "he shall let them go at $30-45$ second intervals" to read "at 5 second intervals".

Present were representatives from the following rides: Badger, St. Jude, Wolf Creek, Glacier Trails, Hayward, AHDRA I, ApDRA, Sunset Valley, AHDRA II, Neillsville, Pallsades, Valhalla and Last D1tch. The treasurer's report was approved as circulated. Cop. attached.

The following new rides were approved unanimously : Shenandoah Riding Center Symposium a Competitive Ride, Columbus, Jordan, Miles City, Ingomar, Baker and Baraga Flains.

The issues listed below had been referred to the rider representatives for consideration

1) Stallions. It was suggested that stallions be given more time at a ret stop to recoverr JoAnne Gernant moved and Wanda Van Meir seconded that stallivilo wust meet the same parameters as mares and geldings. Motion carried.
2) Trail Marking. In the case where a trail is repeated going in opposite directions it was suggested that markers in two colors be used. Wanda Van Melr moved and JoAnne Gernant seconded that a rule not be made to cover this proposal. It will be included as a suggestion in the Ride Manager's Manual.
3) Stop and Go Rides. It was suggested that UMECRA prepare guidelines for "stop and go" type rides similar to the one used at Glacier Trails in "81. Lindsay Taliaferro move and Rick Nelson seconded that "Ride management may opt to use the following "stop and go" procedure, but must provide notification in the ride brochure or Newsletter
a) A rider entering a vet check may present his horse for a $\mathrm{p} / \mathrm{r}$ readin $g$ at any time withing 20 minutes. Fallure to meet the $\mathrm{p} / \mathrm{r}$ parameters will require a recheck within the 20 -minute 11 mitation, but a maximum of 10 minutes, i.e., the combination of original check time period plus the re-check time period may not axceed 20 minutes. Failure to meet the $\mathrm{p} / \mathrm{r}$ parameters at the recheck requirea Disqualification.
b) Horses passing the $p / r$ parameters must remain at the vet check for an additional 15 minute rest period.
c) The $p / r$ team will enter the time passed and time out on the time card." Motion carried.

Dr. Beecher discussed the "King Richard's Fair" which presents a program of 3-day cross country horse racing on the July 4 weekend. The sponsors of this event have requested that it be advertised in our brochure. Dr. Beecher moved that this ber allowed, with the fee to be $\$ 50$. Louise Riedel seconded. Motion carried.

Discussion followed on the method of electing rider representatives. Ted Cooper moved that the incumbent rider representatives, JoAnne Gernant and R.T. Guy, reinain in office for another year. Dr . Beecher seconded. Motion carried 21-1. Lindsay Taliaferro moved that in the future, election of rider representatives be conducted by mail dallot through the Newsletter, with nominations to be made in August and elective ballots to be returned to the secretary no later than November, 1. Family memberships will be entitled to two ballots and individual memberships to one. Motion carried.

A request has been made that in the case of a protest which was disallowed, the protestor be advised of the reasons for denial of the protest. JoAnne Gernant moved that in such a case, the board members should be asked to state their reasons, and the protestor should be so informed, without specifying board members' names. Etta Beecher seconded. Motion carried.

Judy Schlink explained the ten minuto "window" concept as used on competitive rides. A rider shall come in five minutes before or five minutes afterr the exact scheduled time. One point per minute is lost for coming in ahead of or behind the scheduled time. A person may come in up to 60 m 1 nutes late. Gordy Sussman moved that, for a one-year trial period, ride managers have the option to use this concept providing it is announce in the brochure. Louise Riedel seconded. Motion carried 17-5.

Judy Schlink and Rhoda Ritter explained the "combined endurance-competitive" ride concept. No action was taken.

The proposed AERC raises in dues and ride fees were discussed. Ride managers were asked to state their opinions in writing to be presented at the AERC convention by the Midwest regional directors.

JoAnne Gernant mentioned the problems of several riders coming in on endurance rides in a deliberate tie, resulting in all such riders receiving the same number of points. JoAnne moved that ties not be scored as such in endurance rides, and that the tie be broken by using $p / r$ 's.. There was no second.

Lindsay Taliaferro moved that the rule changes as proposed by the Board at their December 12 meeting be accepted in total. Rick Nelson seconded. The motion was defeated 11-7.

The first suggested rule: "There must be a marker two miles from the finish line" was approved Linanimously.

The second suggested rule: $V^{\prime \prime}$ Any distressed horse requiring medication for any physiological reasons before leaving the grounds will be disqualified. (Physiological reasons to include colic, fatigue, tying up, thumps, etc.) Any medication administered on the grounds must be under the supervision of a veterinarian." Passed dee 19-3

Ted Cooper proved that the remainder of the proposed rules be accepted as written. Motion seconded and carried unanimously. They are as follows:
I. General:

Add: (following present rule 20) "Anyone having outstanding debts to UMECRA or a UPECRA ride will be disallowed from receiving points, year end awards or mileage accumulation.
Add: (following the above.) The normal criteria for advancement is $72 / 40$. (pulse parameter to be changed from 70 to 72 wherever mentioned.
II. Competitive Rides.

Add: (to rule 8) "Forward motion must be maintained the last two miles."
Add; (following rule 11) "No ice, lineaments or braces may be used before the final vet check."
Add: (following the above) "There must be a minimum of one rest stop per 25 miles or increment thereof.
Add: (to 14 A 2$) \mathrm{b}$ ) " $\mathrm{P} / \mathrm{r}$ 's shall be taken for a minimum of 15 seconds and recorded as actual during the recording period.
Delete: ( 14 A 2 ) d) which reads "The normal criteria for advancement is a pulse of 70 and a respiration of $40^{\prime \prime}$ This was transferred to the General rules above
Change: ( 14 A 2 )e) That portion which reads "he shall let them go at 30 m second intervals" to read "at 5 second intervals"

The next order of business was election of officers
Nominated for president were Lindsay Taliaferro, JoAnne Gernant and Rick Nelson. The balloting resulted in a three-way tie. Revolting resulted in the election of Lindsay. Dr. Beecher was nominated for vice-president. JoAnne Gernant voted to cast a unanimous ballot. Wanda Van Meir seconded. Carried.
Louise Riedel was nominated for secretary-treasurer,by Risk Nelson who moved to cast a unanimous ballot. Seconded by Wanda Van Meir. carried. Nominated for the Board of Directors were JoAnne Gernant, Ted Cooper, Rick Nelson and Jan Worthington. JoAnne Gernant was elected, with a tie between Cooper and Worthington. Be-voting resulted in the election of ted Cooper.

The meeting was adjourned.

The UMECRA Board of Directors met January 4 in Dubuque. Present were Lindsay Taliaferro, Dr. Beecher, John MacDonald, Ted Coopiar, JoAnne Gernant and Louise Riedel

JoAnne Gernant moved to eliminate the selling of clothing (Jackets \& t'shirts) after disposing of the present stock. John MacDonald seconded. Motion carried.

Eindsay moved that UMECRA participate in the MidwestHorse Fair in April on a pro rata cost basis, dependant on whether AHDRA, ApDRA and AERC also participate. John MacDnnald seconded. Carried.

Lindsay moved that each ride priortto the annual meeting advise the secretary as to who the authorized voting delegates and/or alternates will be. Beecher seconded. Carried.

JoAnne Gernant moved that the Hoofbeat ride be put on probation because of lack of properly measured and marked trails and proper organizational procedure. Beecher seconded. Carried

Louisse moved that the Merrill ride be taken off probation. Seconded and carried.

Lindsay moveld to place the Last Ditch ride on probation for violation of the rule settiag \(72 / 40\) pulse and respiration as a criteria to go on. Beecher seconded. Motion defeated.

Lindsay moved to rescind the Board's previous action with regard to the St. Jude ride in which all fees were excused. JoAnne seconded. Carried. (All charity rides will henceforth pay sanctioning and rider fees)

Lindsay moved that the Junior rider entry Lee be put on the agenda for the annual meeting. Seconded and carried.

JoAnne moved that the board recommend to the annual meeting that, due to increased costs of printing and postage, dues be raised to \(\$ 86.00\) single aad \(\$ 12.00\) family. Lindsay seconded. Carried.

JoAnne moved that the board recommend the increase in ride sanctioning fees to \(\$ 45\) to cover increased cost of materials.
It was moved, seconded and carried that the following rule changes be considered at the annual meeting.

II B 1 a. For 1982 the "Hrindow" concept may be used on a trial basis. Delete words underlined.
II D 1 e. Delete the following. Lameness: A horse completing the ride judged to be clinically lame shall not be eligible for awards other than completion. (This issue is now addressed by the use of the score sheets)
II D 2 Delete "Although horses do not have to meet the \(72 / 40\) criteria at spot checks the veterinarian may hold the horse for a longer examination". Add "Horses do not have to meet the 72/40 criteria at spot checks. A horse shall not be held at a spot check. If in the veterinarian's opinion the horse is critical, the horse should be pulled"
II E 1. Delete, Add " Horses shall all be kept under uniform conditions. If a contestant wishes to walk the horse during the night he may do so, but must do it himself.
III C. Delete. Substitute "The winner of the ride is the horse and rider who successfully complete the ride in the fastest time.

Rule I. C. 5. (concerning distressed horses requiring medication) The board has requested Dr. Beecher, together with several other veterinarians to present a concensus on clarification of the rule at the annual meeting.
Lindsay requested Dr. Beecher to consult with several other veterinarians with the purpose of revising the score sheet.

It was moved, seconded and carried that a symposium be held Sunday morning following the annual meeting from \(8: 30\) to \(10: 00\) for all ride managers, secretaries, veterinarians and other interested persons. Topics will include a thorough presentation of ride management and veterinarian responsibilities.

JoAnne moved to recommend that the derby system be changed to the"limited distance award". under which only 125 competitive miles and 250 endurance miles will count. If the points so dictate the rider can place in both open and limited distance; however once a rider goes over these mileages he is nolonger eligible for the limited distance award. All senior members are eligible and UMECRA will provide year end awards through 6th place for both endurance and competitive riders in both weight divisions.

The Board voted to add the proposed scoring system change to the agenda for the annual meeting. (See December Newsletter for details of this system)

Dr. Beecher moved that UMECRA donate \(\$ 100\) to the International Arabian Horse association for the purchase of awards for the championship endurance ride to be held in Cascade in June. This rill be an open ride, UMECRA and AERC sanctioned, with dual awards. Lindsay seconded, Carried.

Ted Cooper moved that the by-laws be amended to provide for two more rider representatives, and that for this year the Sd and 4th'xplaces in the rider representative election will fill those positions. JoAnne seconded. Motion carried. The by-laws state that this motion can be settled at the next Board meeting.

The Board of Directors of UMECRA met at \(10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}\). at the Midway Motor Iodge, Janesville, Wisconsin. Present were Lindsay Taliaferro, Dr. Beecher, Louise Riedel, Ted Cooper, John MacDonald and JoAnne Gernant, Directors; and Chuck Melcher, newly elected rider representative.

The first item of business was to change Item IV, Section 3 of the Articles of Incerporation to read ". . . . . Four delegates chosen at large by the individual and family members shall be accredited voting members at any general meeting."

A problem concerning sponsorship of the Merrill Ride was presented to the Board. The Merrill Riders Club has been the sanctioning body for several years. Three former members of the Merrill Club who have managed the ride for the past two years have resigned from the Club due to their feeling that they were receiving very little participation from club members thile profits from the ride were being channelled into show activities. They wish to put on the ride under the title, Prairie River Ride. Both parties to the disagreement had been asked to present letters to the Board, but only the Prairie River group had done so. The Merrill Riders Club wishes to retain the date, but at this point have no concrete plans to present, as far as actually putting on the ride. JoAnne Gernant moved to accept the group which had made a definite commitment to put on a ride. The date will be awarded to the Prairie River Ride (Aug 27, 28). Motion seconded and carried.

The next question concerned the dates of May 14, 15, which have been traditionally used by the Badger Ride for the Wisconsin Arabian Horse Association. At this point no one from WAHA has been named as ride manager to replace John MacDonald. Applicatiin for the date has been made for the Shenandoah Riding Center for a symposium and competitive ride. If no one from WAHA is present to be seated at the meeting this afternoon, this date will go to Shenandoah.

The proposed scoring system was discussed. Dr. Beecher moved that since the Board feels that there is no advantage in changing the present system, it will remain in effect unless there is a motion otherwise from the floor of the general meeting. Motion seconded and carried.

Due to the increased number of rides and events per ride, it has become almost impossible for UMECRA to continue to furnish Junior ribbons. JoAnne moved that we not raise ride fees to \(\$ 45\) as proposed, but that the rides take care of their own junior ribbons. There will be no restriction on the junior entry fee, but it is recommended that the rides try to keep these fees as low as possible. Motion seconded and carried.

The 1000 -mile horse award program was discussed. It was moved that anyone entering the program for the first time will pay a nomination fee of \(\$ 10\) and miles will be counted from that time. Anyone wishing to have back miles counted mayda fee of \(\$ 15\) per year or portion thereof for which they wish to have miles researched. Motion seconded and carried.

It was moved that UMECRA donate \(\$ 100\) to any national championship ride put on by any breed organization that takes place in the Midwest and is sanctioned by UMECRA. Motion seconded and carried.


ANNUAL MEETING
1:30 p.m., January 15, 1983
The annual meeting was held at the Midway Motor Lodge, Janesville, Wisconsin, The meeting was called to order by the president, Lindsay Taliaferro, The minutes of the 1982 which had been mailed were approved as corrected. The treasurer's report was approved as circulated at the meeting. (Copy attached to these minutes)

Lindsay announced that the Board had acted to change the Articles of Incorporation to affirm the election of four rider representatives as voting members. They are also eligible to election as officers or directors. The following rider representatives were installed and seated: JoAnne Gernant, Chuck Melcher, Marian MacDonald and Ron Schmid.

Responding to roll call were representatives of the following rides: Battle Creek Hunt, Ride for Equine Research, St. Jude, Grand Island, Wolf Creek, Glacier Trails, Hayward, International Arabian Championship Endurance Ride, ApDRA, SE Minnesota, Sunset Valley, AHDRA, Neillsville, Minnesota Rive Valley, Wilderness, Palisades, Pillager Cup, Kettle Moraine, Valhalla, Jubilee, Camp Courage, Last Ditch and Newton Lake. Forty four were entitled to vote.

The next item of business was to confirm the schedule. The date of May 14, 15, which had been the Badger Ride was left open by the failure of WAHA to appoint a ride manager. Harriet Haenert had requested the date if not used by WAHA for the Shenandoah Riding Center Symposium and Competitive Ride. There being no one present from WAHA, it will be awarded to Shenandoah.

The Board took action earlier in the day in the case of the Merrill Ride. The group who had been managing the ride for the Nerrill Riders Club have left this club and wish to put on the ride as the Prairie River Ride. The Board voted to sanction that ride.

Dr. Beecher announced the International Arabian Horse Association national championship 50 and 100 mile endurance rides on June 18, 19. This ride will be run concurrently with the AHDRA ride and is open to all breeds.

The following rule changes were considered and motions were made and carried in separate actions to accept them all:
II B 1 a. For 1982 the "window" concept may be used on a trial basis. Delete words underlined.

II D 1 e. Delete the following. Lameness: A horse completing the ride judged to be clinically lame shall not be eligible for awards other than completion. (this issue is now addressed by the use of the score sheets)
II D 2. Delete "Al though horses do not have to meet the \(72 / 40\) criteria at spot checks, the veterinarian may hold the horse for a longer examination." Add "Horses do not have to meet the \(72 / 40 \mathrm{cri}-\) teria at spot checks. A horse shall not be held at a spot check. If in the veterinarian's opinion the horse is critical, the horse should be pulled."
II E 1. Delete. Add " Horses shall all be kept under uniform conditions. If a contestant wishes to walk the horse during the night he may do so, but must do it himself.
III C. Delete. Substitute "The winner of the ride is the horse and rider who successfully complete the ride in the fastest time." Successful completion is defined in the Veterinary Guidelines manual.
Add Rule C. 3 a. "A horse that has required a recheck shall not be penalized by being held extra time."

The rule concerning medication of stressed horses had been referred to Dr. Beecher who recommended that the rule read: "Any distressed horse requiring medication mithin four hours of completion shall be disqualified. . . ." The question was raised as to whether a horse that was taken home before four hours would then be disqualified. After lengthy discussion it became apparent that no satisfactory solution could be found. It was moved to send the motion back to committeq and that the present rule which states "any stressed horse requiring medication before leaving the grounds. . ." will stand.

A motion was made to add Rule Rule II C 7: "No whips etc, will be used or in hand in the pre- or post-ride examination or any examination during the course of the ride. The horse is expected to trot out freely in hand when asked to do so. Failure of a horse to trot out when asked should result in points being deducted." Motion seconded and carried.

Revision of the score sheet had been referred to a committee of veterinarians. It will be completed prior to printing. There will be provision made for "plus points in \(\mathrm{p} / \mathrm{r}\) scoring.

Regarding the proposal for changing the scoring system for year-end awards: The board's decision was to recommend leaving the scoring system as it presently exists. There being no motion to the contrary from the floor, the system will remain the same.

It was moved, seconded and carried to change the present "derby" system to a "limited distance award as follows: Only 125 competitive and 250 endurance miles will count. If the points so dictate, the rider can place in both open and limited distance; however once a rider goes over these mileages he is no loner eligible for the limited distance award. All senior members are eligible and UNECRA will provide year end awards through 6th place for both endurance and competitive riders in both weight divisions.

It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the board's recommendation as follows: Ride fees will not be raised as proposed, but the rides in the future will take care of furnishing their own junior ribbons. There will be no restriction on the junior entry fee, but it is recommended that the rides try to keep these fees as low as possible.

The Board recommends the following change in the 1000 -mile horse award. Anyone entering the program for the first time will pay a nomination fee of \(\$ 10\), and miles will be counted from that time. Anyome wishing to have back miles counted may pay a fee of \(\$ 15\) per year, or portion thereof: for which they wish to have miles reserached. The rider should provide as complete a list of his rides as possible. Motion carried.

It was moved that the annual dues be raised from \(\$ 5\) to \(\$ 8\) for an individual membership; and from \(\$ 7\) to \(\$ 12\) for a family membership. Motion seconded and carried.

The Board has moved to donate \(\$ 100\) to any national championship ride put on by any breed organization that takes place in the Midwest and is sanctioned by UMECRA. It was moved, seconded and carried to support this action.

Elections of officers and directors followed.

Nominated for president were Ron Schmid and JoAnne Gernant. The first ballot resulted in a tie. Ron was elected on the second ballot.

Dr. Beecher was nominated for vice president. There being no further nominations a unanimous ballot was cast.

Louise Riedel was nominated for secretary-treasurer. There being no further nominations a unanimous ballot was cast.

Jan Worthington, JoAnne Gernant and Marian MacDonald were nominated for one of the directorships. JoAnne Gernant was elected.

Jan Worthington, Jim Johnson, Marian MacDonald and Chuck Melcher were nominated for the second directorship. Jan Worthington was elected.

Hindsay Taliaferro will serve on the Board as past president.
There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.


The Board of Directors met following the Last Ditch Endurance Ride, October 22. Present were Ron Schmid, Jan Worthington, Lindsay Taliaferro, Dr. Beecher, JoAnne Gernant, Louise Riedel and ride representatives Marian MacDonald and Chuck Melcher. Eusiness consisted of considering the protest filed by Tom Johnson, claiming that the front two runners at the Wilderness Ride departed from the marked trail. After considering his protest and statements made by the ride veterinarian, ride secretary and manager, the Board voted to uphold the protest, to disqualify the numbers 1 \& 2 finishers (Robert Woods and Terry quinn) and to place the ride on probation because management failed to fulfill its duties and responsibilities in regard to UMECRA rules (considering competitors' leaving the marked trail)

The Board of Directors met in Dubuque. Present were Ron Schmid, presiding, Dr. R.A. Beecher, Louise Riedel, JoAnne Gernant, Jan Wortington, Lindsay Taliaferro, and rider representative, Marian MacDonald.

Letters were read concerning the Pillager Cup Ride from Bob Johnson, president of the Northern Minnesota Arabian Horse Association and from Attorney Steve Hanson, representing Marilyn Miller, who has managed the ride for several years. A tape recording also presented Ms Miller's viewpoint. Both parties wish to put on the 1984 Pillager Cup ride and UNECRA was asked to grant sanctioning to one or the other. The Board felt that the differences, which primarily concern financial matters were an internal affair, in which UMECRA should not intervene. It was moved that the Northern Minnesota Arabian Horse Association, which has been the official sanctioning body since the ride's inception, should retain the traditional date and the name "Pillager Cup", with the stipulation that she club give us the new ride manager's name by January 15. UMECRA will offer an alternate date to the former manager and ride committee for a ride under a different name. Motion seconded and carried.

A communication was received from Sara Davis concerning an infraction of a rule at the Last Ditch endurance ride where a junior was entered in the lightweight division. The Board agreed that Rule IIIB was broken, but since no protest was filed as specified in Rule. I.F, there was no action to be taken. (By way of explanation it should be noted that, due to an inconsistency in our rules, the infraction was not detected at the ride, although all the board members and rider representatives were present. Under competitive rules juniors are allowed to, and have been riding in the open division).

Sara Davis's communication further requested that we discuss \(p / r\) parameters with the object of lowering respiration requirements; and that we consider the practice of timing horses in and out that arrive within one minute. No action was taken on the first proposal; the second question was addressed later in the meeting.

JoAnne recommended that, when preparing their information sheets for the ride brochure, starting times for the rides not be announced so that management may be free to set an early start depending on weather conditions. It was moved, seconded and carried that this suggestion be incorporated in the Ride Manager's Manual and announced at the annual meeting.

JoAnne recommended that rides assess a post entry fee of \(\$ 5.00\) for entries not received two weeks prior to the ride. (At the discretion of the ride, entry fees need not be sent in advance). It was moved, seconded and carried that this suggestion be incorporated in the Ride Manager's Manual and announced at the annual meeting.

It was moved, seconded and carried that in order to conform to AERC, rules II A 3 and III B which presently read "there shall also be a junior division, not to be 16 as of January \(1^{\prime \prime}\) be amended to read", \(0^{\circ}{ }^{\circ}\). Not to be 16 as of December 1."
Louise moved and JoAnne seconded that, in order to eliminate the present inconsistency between endurance and competitive rules concerning juniors, the following amendments be made in rules II A 3 and IIIB to read: "Juniors must ride in the junior division" A junior division shall be added in the limited distance concept." Motion carried. Whine cone spy
Jan moved, it was seconded and carried to delete rule II A 1 and to substitute the following. "A person can compete as a novice only on bis or her first and second \(\mathcal{Z}\) ride. Novices are not eligible for year end awards, but mileage shall count"

Ron moved to change the criteria for the limited distance award to read "up to 145 miles or less competitive; and 295 miles or less endurance. A junior division will be added." Lindsay seconded. Motion carried.

A letter from David Zontelli was read expressing a preference for the modified "stop and go" type of endurance vet check as described in Rule III H. Ron moved that this type of vet check be made mandatory with the following change: "the mandatory hold shall be a minimum of 20 minutes" (instead of 15). Beecher seconded. Motion carried. As a point of explanation, the following shall be included in the Ride Manager's manual. "For purposes of reporting modified stop and go rides, the following formia shall be used: 'A rider's total elapsed time minus the mandatory holds time equals his ride time." In other words the time a rider takes to present his horse to the veterinarian is not included in computation. (1he Board felt that adoption of the above motion would resolve the problem of timing horses in \& out that arrive minthin
It was suggested that it would be appropriate to participate in the Minnesota Horse Fair in April 1984 rather than at the fair in Madison as in the past several years. As an alternative to attending a horse fair it was suggested that we use advertising in selected horse-related publications. JoAnne moved and Lindsay seconded that we recommend to the annual meeting that a position of "advertising manager" be established. This person would investigate the possibility of running ads in local or area publications (i.e. the Libertyville Sentinel and the Stable Sheet). A budget of \(\$ 200\) would be allocated. Motion carried.
The secretary was given the authority to order \(50 \quad 1000\)-mile trophies.
A letter was read from Elinore Tonsor with several suggestions, some of which had already been acted on. She suggested that there should be more than three vet checks on a 100 -mile ride. This will be considered at the board meeting preceding the annual meeting. She also expressed a wish to have horses on a multipleday ride scored at the end of each day. Beecher moved that Rule II E 2 be deleted and the following substituted. "Horses must be evaluated and scored at the end of each day for the criteria on the UMECRA score sheet. The morning's evaluation is at the discretion of the veterinarian".
ApDRA sent the following recommendations: One pail of water be allowed for sponging on competitive rides (for sloshing below the knees only) and water be allowed at one road crossing. No action was taken. That UMECRA fund a post mortem on deceased horses with the owner's permission. Dr. Beecher pointed out that the cost could vary so widely that UMECRA could not be safely committed to this concept. No action taken.

Counting of the ballots for rider represented resulted in the following being elected: Marsha Achenbach, JoAnne Gernant, Paul Heberling and Ron Schmid.

\section*{MEETING}

Madison, Wisconsin, Jan 28, 1984

Present were Ron Schmid, president, Dr. Beecher, Louise Riedel, Jan Worthington, JoAnne Gernant, Lindsay Taliaferro, and Marsha Achenbach and Paul Heberling, rider representatives.

The following additions were made to the minutes of the December 3 board meeting 8

It was moved and seconded that the following be deleted from Rule If B 1 a (concerning the "Window System". "If a ride opts to use this system it must be announced in the ride brochure or the Newsletter." Motion defeated.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the following be added to Rule I A (pertaining to age of horses) "January 1 to be considered the common birthdate."

The agenda for the general meeting was set.

The suggestion that there should be more than three vet checks on
 bust had not been discussed. It was decided that Dr. Beecher would address this question at the general meeting with the view to incorporating some guidelines in the Ride Managers Manual

Paul Heberling proposed that year-end endurance awards be increased in number from six to ten. JoAnne moved, it was seconded and carried that in all divisions there will always be six year-end awards. Places down to 10 th in all divisions will be awarded to those who have 20 points or more.


The Board of Directors met December 1, 1984. Present were Ron Schmid, Dr. Beecher, Louise Riedel, Jan Worthington, JoAnne Gernant, Lindsay Taliaferro, and rider representatives Marsha Achenbach and Paul Heberling.

The meeting was called to order by Ron Ichmid. The Board agreed that since there was anyenumber of voting members (6) a tie vote on a motion to include an item on the agenda would result in that item being included.

The first order of business was the protest filed by Peggy Steiner concerning medication of a horse on the Kettle Moraine Ride, which under Rule I C 6 might be considered cause for disqualification. After consideration by the Board of statements by the owner of the horse in question, the head veterinarian and ride manager, it was decided that the rule had not been violated. Lindsay moved and Louise seconded that the protest be denied. Passed unanimously.

Lindsay moved that the following proposed rule change be put on the agenda for the annual meeting:

Rule I C 6 shall be changed to read:
Horses shall be certified for completion if they:
a. Could be safely ridden further, are capable of going on even if at a reduced speed.
b. Have stable vital signs and are showing subjective and objective signs of recovery ( \(\mathrm{p} / \mathrm{r}\) values \(10 \%\) higher than required during the ride may be acceptable.
c. Have not required and/or received medication for any metabolic reasons before leaving the grounds. (Netabolic reasons to include colic, tying up, thumps, etc.) Any medication administered on the grounds must be under the supervision of a veterinarian.
d. Are not lame (grade 3, 4 or 5) at the walk.

JoAnne seconded. Motion carried.
Ron presented a letter from Sara Davis concerning the Riders' Choice award as presented at the 1984 annual meeting. This award is presented by an individual, and ballots are collected and counted by an individual. JoAnne moved that therefore, since UNECRA has no jurisdiction over this award, no action will be taken. Iindsay seconded. Motion carried.

At this point the ballots having been counted by Judy Schmid and Christine Taliaferro, the following were announced as rider representatives: Paul Heberling, Marsha Achenbach, Dale Scott and JoAnne Gernant.

Dr. Beecher moved that the following be placed on the agenda for the annual meeting: (Change underlined)

Rule II B a (concerning the window system on competitive rides) be changed to read "Five minutes per minute are lost for coming in . . .behind the scheduled time." motion amended to read "three" minutes. Lindsay seconded. Motion defeated 4-1.

Dr. Beecher moved that the following proposed rule change be put on the agenda for the annual meeting: (Change underlined)
"Rule I B 5 (concerning changes at rides) shall read "However any changes must be made and announced prior to the day's ride or may be announced at any point on the trail as long as it applies equally to all riders."

Jan moved that the following proposed rule change be put on the agenda for the annual meeting. (Change underlined)

Rule II B 1 (concerning times foi competitive rides) shall be changed to read: "The maximum riding time should average 6 - \(7 \mathrm{~m} \cdot \mathrm{p}_{\mathrm{i}} \mathrm{h}^{-}\), three-and-a-half to four hours being the minimum time for a 25 -mile competitive ride."

To become rule III \(H\), subsequent rules to be numbered accordingly. "There must be a minimum of two vet checks on a 50 -mile endurance ride and a minimum of three vet checks on a 100 -mile endurance ride, not to include the final checks.

The Board of Directors recommended that the following three suggestions be incorporated into the Ride Managers Manuals

When the information sheets for the ride brcchure are prepared, the starting times not be announced so that management may be free to set an early start depending on weather conditions.

That rides assess a post entry fee of \(\$ 5.00\) for entries not received two weeks prior to the ride. (At the discretion of the ride, entry fees need not be sent in advance.)
On 100 mile rides, horses should be stopped a sufficient number of times to insure their safety, depending on weather and trail conditions. It is recommended that checks should be more frequent than at \(25-m i l e\) intervals, especially during the last half of the ride. It is important that the veterinarians on 100 -mile rides be experienced with the longer events.
There were no objections. Since the above are not binding rules no vote was considered necessary.

The Board of Directors recommended approval of the following six rule changes They were discussed and voted on individually. All were carried.

That the following be added to Rule I A 1 pertaining to age of horses.
"January 1 to be considered the common birthdate."
That in order to conform to AERC, rulas II A 3 and III B which presently read "there shall also be a junior division, not tc be 16 as of January \(1^{\prime \prime}\) be amended to read ". . Not to be.16 as of December 1".
That in order to eliminate the present inconsistency between endurance and competitive rules concerning juniors, the following amendments be be made in rules II A 3 and III B to reads "Juniors must ride in the junior division." A junior division shall be added in the limited distance concept.

That Rule II A 1 be deleted and the following substituted. "A person can compete as a novice only on his or her first and second ride. Novices are not eligible for year end awards, but mileage shall count."

That Rule II E 2 be deleted and the following substituted: (concerning multiple day rides) "Horses must be evaluated and scored at the end of each day as to the criteria on the UMECRA score sheet. The morning's evaluation on the second and following days is at the discretion of the veterinarian."

It was moved, seconded and carried to change the criteria for the limited distance award to read "up to 145 miles or less of completed competitive rides and up to 295 miles or less of completed endurance rides. A junior division will be added in both endurance and competitive."

It was moved, seconded and carried that "A position of 'advertising manager' be established. This person would investigate the possibilitiy of running ads in local or area publications. A budget of \(\$ 200\) would be allocated." Other methods of securing publicity were discussed. Lori Tlmberlake volunteered to serve in a public relations capacity. Elinore Tonsor will work with her. The secretary announced that UMECRA will furnish handouts and other material to anyone who wishes to promote the sport through fairs, \(4-\mathrm{H}\), saddle clubs etc.

It was moved and seconded that in all divisions there will be a minimum of top-six year end awards. Places down through 10 th will be given in all divisions to those who have a score of 20 points or more. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the modified "stop and go"type of endurance vet check as described in Rule III \(H\) be made mandatory with the following chalge: "the mandatory hold shall be a minimum of 20 minutes (instead of 15). The motion was defeated.
*
Election of officers followed resulting in the uncontested election of Ron Schmid, president; Dr. R. A. Beecher, vice preseident and Louise Riedel secretary-treasurer. Nominated for the first directorship were Jan Worthington, Judy Schlink, Chuck Melcher and JoAnne Gernant. JoAnne Gernant was elected. Nominated for the second directorship were Chabk Melcher, Jan Worthington, Marsha Achenbach, Judy Schlink and Jim Johnson. Jan Worthington was elected.

The meeting was adjourned.


It was moved, seconded and camried to sanction three new rides: Yankee Springs (Michigan), Putnam County (Indiana) and Camp Confidence Charity Cup (Minnesota).

BOARD OF DIRECTORS
MEETING
LaCrosse Wisconsin, January 26, 1985

Present were Ron Schmid, Dr. Beecher, Louise Riedel, Lindsay Taliaferro, Jan Worthington, JoAnne Gernant and rider representatives Paul Heberling and Dale Scott.

Old Business: JoAnne Gernant had prepared a proposal for 2 year-end famill award. It will be/agenda for the general meeting.

A letter from Al Moeller of the Yankee Springs ride was read suggesting that all rules pertaining to riders be printed in the brochure, specifically the rule pertaining to disqualification of horses at the end of the ride. Proposed rule change 1 C 6 will cover this. He also inquired whether the statement concerning time and speed of a competitive ride is a guideline or a firm rule (Rule II B 1.) In this context JoAnne moved to change existing Rule II B 1 to read "maximum riding time will average. . .." (replacing "should average"). Motion seconded and carried. JoAnne then moved to change the proposed change to rule II B 1 to read "will daverage" rather than "should average." Motion carried.
\(\therefore\) Louise moved to change the method of computing year end points to give one completion point for each 25 miles of a successfully completed ride. (both competitive and endurance. The point of this motion is to equalize the points earned in endurance and competitive riding for the purpose of earning the year-end high point rider awards.)

Louise reported that she had received a proposal for putting UMECRA ride results on computer for \(\$ 100\) for the 1985 season, plus the cost of disks. JoAnne moved to accept this offer. Seconded and carried. It was recommended that a new typewriter be purchased, to be the property of UMECRA. Trig IRS has informed us that they cannot process our request for tax -exempt status due to the fact that we presented a "non-conforming" copy of our articles of Incorporation. Steve Hanson, an attorney from Minnesota, agreed to assist us in this matter and discovered that the original articles were never filed in the State of Minnesota. It was the consensus of the Board that we meet with Steve as to the necessity of drawing up and filing new Articles.

A proposal was received that, in relation to picking up back mileage for 1000 mile nominations, if the rider is agreeable with AERC's mileage record, UMECRA accept this figure, without charging the established penalty fees for researching the record. It was also proposed that non-UMECRA rides count for mileage only. It was the consensus of the Board that our present regulations in these respects continue to apply.


The annual meeting was called to order by president, Ron Schmid. The secretary's report from the 1984 annual meeting was approved as mailed. The 1984 financial statement was approved as circulated. Delegates from the following rides responded to roll call: St. Jude, Grand Island, Ride for Research, Glacier Trails, Hayward, MOlf Creek, AHDRA I \& II, ApDRA, SE Minnesota, Wildcat Mountain, Neillsville, Charity Cup Ride, Keweenaw, Kettle Moraine, SAHARA, Mt. Valhalla, Arab Inc, Michibay, and Son of a Ditch.

It was moved to add Rule I C 4, subsequent rules to be numbered accordingly: "A rider may ask for one recheck on \(2 \mathrm{p} / \mathrm{r}\). It must be taken immediately, and the rider must accept the second score, whether higher or lower." Morion carried.

It was moved to amend Rule I B 5 to read "However any changes must be made and announced prior to the day's ride or may be announced at any point on the trail as long as it applies equally to all riders. Motion seconded and carried.

It was moved to Add to Rule I C 2. "A veterinarian must be present at all check points." Motion defeated 24-15

It was moved that I C 6 shall be changed to reads
Horses shall be certified for completion and placing if they
a. Could be safely ridden further, are capable of going on even if at a reduced speed.
b. Have stable vital signs and are showing subjective and objective signs of recovery ( \(\mathrm{p} / \mathrm{r}\) values \(10 \%\) higher than required during the ride may be acceptable.
c. Have not required and/or received medication for any metabolic reasons before leaving the grounds. (Metabolic reasons to include colic, tying up, thumpscetc.)
d. Are not lame at the walk.

Motion carried.
It was moved to amend Rule I C 3 to read "The normal criteria for advancement
\(r\) is pulse of 68 , respiration of 68 . Motion carried, 28-16.
It was moved to change Rule II C 5 to read " "Natuniwater only is allowed on the trail. Drinkiag water only is allowed at rest stops. A horse shall not be denied drinking water at any time at 2 vet check. It was moved to amend the motion to read "A horse shall not be denied drinking water from a bucket and/or mther approved source at a scheduled vet check" Seconded and carried.

Opiginal motion as amended carried.
Pursuant to action taken at the preceding board meeting it was moved to amend existing Rule II B 1 to read "maximum riding time will average. .." (replacing"should average". It was moved to amend by substituting "shall" for "will". Amendment defeated. Original motion defeated 19-16.

The rule change to Rule II B 1 as presented in the agenda was presented as follows: Rijle II B 1 shall be changed to read"the maximum riding time will average \(6-7\) milew per hour, three and a-half to four hours being the minimum time for a 25 -mile competitive ride." It was moved to amend this motion as follows: "riding speed shall average 5.5 to 7 miles per hour, \(3 \frac{1}{2}\) to 4 hours being the minimum time for a 25 -mile competitive ride." Amendment carried. Original motion as amended carried.

It was moved that Rule II B 8 be changed to read "a rider must complete the ride In \(12.5 \%\) shorter time than that of the regular time." (concerning stress divisions) Motion seconded and carried

It was moved that the following shall be added to Rules II B 2 and Rule III A "All heavyweight riders must be weighed with tack prior to the ride." Motion seconded and carried.

It was moved to change Rules II B 2 and III A to read "There shall be two weight divisions as follows . . . Heavyweight - 190 pounds and over." Motion defeated.

It was moved that the following become Rule III \(H\), subsequent rules to be numbered accordingly. "There must be a minimum of two vet checks on a \(50-\mathrm{mile}\) endurance ride and a minimum of three vet checks on a \(100-\) mile endurance ride, not to include the final checks. Motion seconded and carried.

It was moved to change Rule III H 1 to read "A rider entering a vet check may present his horse for a \(\mathrm{p} / \mathrm{r}\) reading at any time within 20 minutes. If the horse fails to pass, the rider may not ask for another check before 10 minutes; however the horse must pass within a total or 20 minutes or be disqualified."It was moved to amend the last sentence to read ". . . The rider may not ask for another check before 10 minutes or at the end of the original 20 minutes, whichever comes first. However the horse must pass within a total of 20 minutes. Amendment passed. Original motion as amended passed.

It was moved to institute a new year-end award, the UMECRA Family Howard with the following criteria:
1. A family shall consist of husband, wife and all/ children who are living at home. The family shall be members of UMECRA.
2. Endurance and competitive points shall be awarded on only one horse and rider combination for each member of the family.
3. Points will be awarded on the same basis as they are accumulated for UMECRA year-end awards.
4. Participants shall be required to keep track of their own scores and turn them in by December 1 so the secretary can verify the points. Failure to turn the points in by this date will eliminate family from standings.
5. Participants are required to register with the secretary before points will be counted. All members of the family who will participate will be listed at this time.
6. A trophy will be awarded to the family who accumulates the most points. The These points may be in competitive, endurance, or a combination thereof. award will be a travelling trophy in memory of Jan Scott, UMECRA to donate a small additional permanent trophy to the winning family.

Motion seconded. Amended to read (criteria \#1) "A family may consist of mother, father, and all dependent children who are living at home." Seconded and carried. Original motion carried as amended.
It was moved to change the method of computing year-end points to award one point for every 25 miles of a successfully completed ride (ie. personswinning a \(50-\mathrm{mile}\) competitive and a \(50-\) mile endurance ride would both receive 14 points). Seconded and carried.
It was moved to accept the proposed 1985 ride schedule . Seconded and carried.
Election of officers followed. JoAnne Gernant and Paul Heberling were nominated for president. Paul was elected. Dr. Beecher and Dale Morris were nominated for 到cepresident. Dale withdrew and Dr. Beecher was elected by acclamation. Louise Riedel was nominated for secretary-treasurer and was elected by acclamation. Art Priesz, Jan Worthington, JoAnne Gernant, Dale Scott and Steve Hanson were nominated for directors. Art and Dale were elected.

A special Board of Directors meeting was held May 18 at the St. Jude ride. Notice of the meeting to execute the Articles of Incorporation and By-laws as amended was given and/or waived. Attending were Paul Heberling, Louise Riedel, Dale Scott, Art Priesz and Ron Schmid. Absent was Dr. Beecher.

The Board discussed the requirement in General Rule I C 7 that the pulse must be 72 in one hour. It was proposed to change this to one-half hour for competitive. It was pointed out that the Board does not have the authority to change rules. (In order to solve this problem which has caused some confusion, ride managers may announce at the pre-ride meeting that the final check will be made in \(\frac{1}{2}\) hour if there are no objections. It is incumbent on riders to be present at pre-ride meetings)

The proposed Articles of Incorporation and By-laws were read by Art Priesz. Changes to the by-laws were proposed by board members. Art moved that the By-laws be adopted as read and amended by the Board. Ron Schmid seconded. Motion carried. Art moved that the Articles of Incorporation be adopted as read. Louise seconded. Motion carried.

Louise moved that a special Newsletter checking account be set up to expedite the handling of receiving and disbursing funds for the Newsletter. There being no second the motion died.

Louise Riedel, Secy.

The Buard of Directors met July 28 , following the Wildcat Mountain rides. Present were Paul Heberling, Louise Riedel, Dale Scott and Ron Schmid A proposal to set up a special account for the operation of the Newsletter was considered.

Dale moved and Ron seconded to set up a checking account to cover transactions for the UMECRA Newsletter. Five hundred dollars will be transferred from the UMECRA general treasury to open the account, which will then be credited with all advertising revenue. The editor will request more funds as required for the operation of the Newsletter. At the end of the fiscal year any funds in excess of \(\$ 500\) in the Newsletter account will be reimbursed to the general UMECRA treasury. The editor will submit a transaction register and balance sheet at the end of the year. The motion carried.

Discussion followed as to a possible course of action concerning a junior rider who has had several unfortunate mishaps on rides. It was decided to adopt a "wait and see" attitude, since due to injuries sustained at this ride she will probably not be participating in the near future. Plans for the 1986 banquet and for awards to be presented were considered. Paul will in=vestigate possible sites and JoAnne Gernant will look into awards.



\section*{BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING}

December 7, 1985
The Board of Directors met December 7, 1985 at the home of Fred and Dianne Kuhn, Rochester, Minnesota. Present were directors: Paul Heberling, Loulse Rledel, Art Priesz, Dale Scott and past president, Ron Schmid. (Paul and Dale also serve as rider representatives)

OLD BUSINESS: Art stated that the Articles of Incorporation have been flled with the state of Minnesota. When they return the recelpt, the papers can be presented to the IRS for the purpose of securing a taxexempt number. Kath Love was appolnted to handle this. Art will prepare a revised ride entry blank which will be more specific as to risks involved. Jt will be considered at the next board meeting.

NEW BUSINESS: Paul presented a proposed agenda for this meeting, which was accepted along with several additions.

The Importance of having veterinarlan input to the Board was discussed. It was decided to invite the head veterinarians from each ride to attend the annual meeting and to sit in on the preceding board meeting. Art was asked to prepare a by-law change to be presented at the annual meeting to provide for a veterinarlan representative to the Board.

The next item of business was consideration of protests flled concerning the Hennepin County and Kettle Moraine rides. Dale moved to uphold the protest concerning the Hennepin County ride on the grounds that since there was no veterinarian present to check some of the horses at the finish, Rule l C 1 was violated. (The ride-must be controlled by veterinarlans). Art seconded. Motion carried. Art moved that the ride be put on probation. Dale seconded. Motion carried.

The Kettle Moraine protest was in four sectlons which were considered separately. The first concerned the fallure to welgh the rider (wlthout tack) of the horse named as best conditloned. Ron moved, Dale seconded that this part of the protest be upheld on the grounds that UMECRA Rule \|I D was violated. (Judging shall follow AERC procedures) and also the procedure as set forth on the AERC evaluation form. Act.moved that there be no change in the award for best condition, since recalculating the best condition form in the light of the revised weight of the rider did not result in a reversal of placing. The second part of the protest concerned the disquallfication of a competitive horse for high respiration at a spot check. Loulse moved, Dale seconded to disallow the protest since Rules II D 2 c (If in the veterinarlan's opinion the horse is critical it should be pulled) and Rule l C3 (The decision of the judges is final) allow this type of action. The third part of the protest concerned a horse being held extra time at a spot check in violation of Rule II D 2 c , resulting in the rider being late (A horse shall not be held at a spot check). Ron moved that this infraction be attached to the probationary condition resulting from the protest in part 1. Motlon carrled. The fourth part of the protest concerned the assumption that the ride speed (after deducting 2 spot checks) averaged at \(7 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{ml}\) les per hour in violation of Rule II B 1 (riding speed shall average 5.5 to 7 mph ) Ron moved to deny this protest because pursuant to rule II B 1 and Rule II D 2 c, time held at spot checks is included in the day's total riding time. Dale seconded. Carried.
the motions made concerning the following proposed rule changes were to put them on the agenda to be Voted on at the annual meeting.

Ron moved, Loulse seconded that Rule IC7 b be changed to read: "Have stable vital signs and are showing subjective and objective signs of recovery one hour from the time of crossing the finish line for endurance and \(\frac{1}{2}\) hour for competitive" (ellminates the criterla of 72 pulse post ride)

Loulse moved that Rule I C 7 be changed to read "Each ride must have a post-finish line vet exam which the horse must pass to qualify for successful completion (specific criterla to be announced prior to the ride). Horses shall be certifled for completion and placing if they:. . . .

Ron moved, Art seconded that Rule \(\|\) B 1 be changed as follows:
"The ride must have a maximum and minim um time limit. The maximum riding speed for regular placings shall average 5.5 to 7.0 M.P.H. - \(3 \frac{1}{2}\) to 4 hours being the minimum (REGULAR) riding time for a 25 mile competitive ride without penalty. A rider may come in up to 60 minutes late before disqualification (PENALTY). One point per minute is deducted from the dally score sheet for coming in late. Riders who complete the ride in \(12 / 5 \%\) shorter time than that of the regular time will recelve \(50 \%\) more placing polnts towards year end awards (for example: 3 to \(3 \frac{1}{2}\) hours for a 25 mlle ride (STRESS). All entries are eligible for all options and do not have to declare before the start of the ride. Completion time wlll decide the number of year-end points and penalty points.


TIMES MAY BE INCREASED PROPORTIONALLY FOR EXTREME WEATHER CONDITIONS OR TRAIL CONDITIONS. THE ENDING OF STRESS tIME AND THE BEGINNING OF REGULAR TIME MUST COINCIDE. THE ENDING OF REGULAR TIME AND THE BEGINNING OF PENALTY TIME MUST COINCIDE. Motion carried.

Delete Rule la, (present window system) and Rule 8 (stress division). Renumber rule 9 to rule 8.

Art moved that as an alternate amendment (in case the previous rule change does not pass), the following should be added to Rule II B 1 a "competitive rides using the window system can not offer a stress division. Ron seconded. Carried.

Loulse moved, Ron seconded that as an alternate amendment (In case the previous major rule change does not pass) that the last sentence in Rule II B 1 a be deleted: "If a ride opts to use this system (window system) it must be announced in the ride brochure or newsletter." motion carried.

Ron moved to delete from Rule 11 D 2 b 4 the words "a minlmum of" to read "P/R's shall be taken for 15 seconds". . . . Motion seconded and carried.

Ron moved, Paul seconded to add to Rule 11 D 2 b 4 "No plus points shall be awarded for pulse and respiration." Carried.

Ron moved to change rule 11 D 2 b 5 by adding the underlined "A pre-ride pulse and respiration, dehydration and capillary refill should be taken so that the judges can get acquainted with the horse. These recordings shall not be used as a reference polnt upon which to determine any future reading or award of points. Motlon seconded and carrled.

Dale moved, Louise seconded to change the bonus points for stress from 50\% to \(25 \%\) Motion carried.

The problem of reconciling the AERC and UMECRA rules concerning junlor riders was discussed. Since a copy of the complete AERC junlor rule was not avallable it was decided to postpone any action until the next board meeting.

It was proposed that limited distance be interpreted to mean that a rider who has completed five rides on one horse cannot be considered for IImited distance award on another horse. It was agreed that the Board not recommend this.

A request had been received to consider giving completion points and m lleage for an entrant who has completed the first section ( \(s\) ) of a multiple day ride but does not complete the entire ride. It was agreed that the Board not recommend this.

A letter from Gordy Sussman was read requesting the Board to institute a new award called the "Bob Smith" award to be given annually to the rider who best epitomizes the motto "To complete is to win", to be nominated by riders and managers following each ride. It was suggested that the name of the award be changed to the "Complete is to Win" award to better describe it.

Paul moved to increase the number of at-large directros from two to four. Art seconded. No bylaw change will be required. Motion carried. At the annual meeting we will elect 4 at-large directors.

A suggestion was received that "riders could be protested against as well as rides. Two blatant violationns would be grounds for banning of accumulation of points for year-end awards." It was the consensus that the board already has the authority to act in cases of rider misconduct. No action taken.

Paul moved, Ron seconded to purchase a used Apple ll E computer including a two-disk drive, monitor and software for \(\$ 1000\). Motion carried.

The meeting adjourned.

Coples of the 1985 financlal report were circulated. paul announced that new entry blank/release forms had been prepared by Art Priesz and will be lncluded in the ride packet.

JoAnne Gernant moved to accept the following amendment to the By-laws to add a veterlnary
representative to the Board of Directors. Bob Wadzinski seconded. Motlon carried. "Proposed Change: Article lll - Board of Directors - Section 1, as follows:

ELECTION OF DIRECTORS. The property and business of this corporation shall be managed by its Board of Directors, which shall be composed of delegates, with the exception of the Board position of Veterinarian representative which will be composed of an endurance or competitive ride veterinarlan. The Board shall not be less than three in number and not more than nine. The Board shall consist of a president, vice presldent, secretary/treasurer, lmmediate past president, and two members elected at large, or more as may be determined appropriate by majority vote of the Board, up to a maximum of four. There also shall be a Board position of veterinarlan representative. Each director shall be elected to serve for one year or until his/her successor shal! have been elected and qualified. All directors shall be elected at the annual meeting by majority vote of the attending delegates of the corporation.

JoAnne moved to accept the AERC Junlor pollcy as part of our rules. Dave Zontelll seconded. Motion carried. AERC Junior policy follows:
1. Junior riders shall have their own division within the AERC point system. (Not eligible for first overall or overall best condition)
2. There shall be a junior best condition judged and recognition made if two or more juniors are competing on the ride. Thls shall be without regard to the avallability of an actual award.
3. Junlors may compete for \(A E R C\) and UMECRA points and awards within their own division on rides of 50 miles or over.
4. Junlor riders may participate in competition only with written consent of parent or guardian.
5. A junior is any young person aged 16 and under as of December 1 of the new ride year. Any junior \(1 s\) required to ride with a sponsor except juntors from the age of 14 to 16 who have completed 500 AERC sanctioned miles and with the written consent of parents or guardians.
6. Sponsor must be an adult rider over the age of 18 and duly entered as a competitor/ participant in the ride. Ride management may allow non-competitor sponsor, when necessary, and junlor then shall receive completion only.
7. A sponsor must be registered by name with ride management before the start of the ride and a junior may not change sponsors EXCEPT at regular stated vet checks and then only with knowledge and consent of ride management. The new sponsor must be registered by name and name written on junlor rider's vet card or recorded at the time of change. Junior may change sponsors only if sponsor pulled or cannot continue the rlde.

JoAnne moved that the proposed change to Rule \(1 \quad C 7\) be rejected. Fred seconded. Motion carried. Tom Plckard moved that the present Rule \(1 \subset 7\) b be amended to read"
"b. For endurance: Have stable vital signs and are showing subjective and objectlve signs of recovery with a pulse of 72 or less one hour from time of crossing the finish line.
fadd \(c\). For competitive: Have stable vital signs and are showing subjective and objective signs of recovery. Renumber present \(c\). and d. to d. and e.

JJoAnne moved, Elinore seconded to disregard proposal to change Rule 1 C 7. Motion carried.

Judy Schlink moved to accept the change to rule ll B 1. Ray Gehrig seconded. Motion defeated.

Bob Wadzinski moved, Ron seconded that the following amendment to rule ll B 1 a be approved: "competitive rides using the window system can not offer a stress division." Loulse moved to amend this amendment to the effect that the stress division be ellminatec on all rides. Anne seconded. Motion carried 38-14. Loulse moved that Rule ll B 8 (providing for the stress division) be deleted and rule ll B 9 be renumbered to replace it. Motion carried 38-14.

Dean moved that we not offer the July 19, 20 Gypsy RoverRanch ride because of conflict with Grand island II. Tom seconded. Motion carried.

The Board of Directors met December 6, 1986 at the home of Fred and Dianne Kuhn, Rochester, Minnesota. Present were Art Priesz, Louise Riedel, Dale Scott, Dr. Dean Peterson, Tom Pickard, Rick Nelson, Mike Thomas, Paul Heberling and Ray Gehrig.

Dianne Kuhn and Audrey Gehrig opened and counted the ballots for rider representatives, resulting in the election of Marsha Achenbach, Ray Gehrig, Paul Heberling and Guy Worthington.

Arrangements for the annual meeting and banquet were discussed. Mike moved to allow Ray Gehrig a sum not to exceed \(\$ 300\) for entertainment. Tom seconded. Motion carried. Rick moved that a sit-down dinner consisting of a choice of three entrees be selected at a cost of \(\$ 11.90\) per person, including tax and tip. Paul seconded. Motion carried. Rick moved, Mike seconded that a "club seating" system of individual tables be utilized for the banquet. Motion carried. Vendors will have a chance to display merchandise in the general meeting room if they desire. An open board meeting will be held Saturday, January 31 at 8:30 a.m. preceding the general meeting.

Mike volunteered to compile a list of names and addresses of ride veterinarians. It was also suggested that we offer to include veterinarians names on our mailing list for the Newsletter if they indicate a desire to receive it.

A discussion followed as to awards needed for presentation at the banquet.
Dr. Feterson moved that the zero pulserespiration point on the score sheet be changed to 36 pulse--8 respiration. Paul Heberling made a friendly amendment to the effect that pulse increments go up by three points for every two beats, and respiration increments remain at two points for every two breaths. Dean accepted this friendly amendment. Motion seconded by Ray Gehrig. Passed with 7 in favor, 1 opposed and 1 abstention.

A new format for the lower half of the score sheet was presented. Points to be deducted in the various areas remain basically the same but the format has been revised and simplified. Louise moved that the bottom section of the score sheet be adopted as presented. Rick seconded. Motion carried.

Rick moved that a letter be written to AERC requesting clarification of their Rule 6 concerning disqualification of a horse after the final vet check. There is conflict between this rule and UMECRA's rule concerning disqualification of a horse that has been treated before leaving the grounds. Motion seconded and carried.

In the case of the following four requests which had been presented, the board elected to take no action; however motions from the floor may be reconsidered in these matters at the general meeting:
1. "If a motion check is to be held at a vet stop, the rider shall be allowed up to departure time to present his horse."
2. "After the ride brochures are published and ride dates accepted by the board, the schedule should be frozen. Rides should not be allowed to change dates or be added to the schedule."
3. "The mandatory 20 -minute hold, endurance stop and go, could be reduced at the end of the season to 10 or 15 minutes."
4. "Completion and mileage (but not placing) should be allowed for a horse that may need metabolic treatment within a period extending to one hour after ride time."

Motions were made to present the following four proposals at the annual meeting:
1. Louise moved to change Rule II B 8 to read "There must be a minimum of one rest stop during each 25 miles or increments over 15 miles thereof. \{For example a ride must be 40 miles or over in order to require two rest stops)."
2. Rick moved to add rule I D 8: "During a veterinary examination the rider must refrain from touching the horse except with the examining veterinarian's permission." Louise seconded. Motion carried with two abstentions.
3. Ray moved to reinstate the stress division. Twenty-five percent more. points will be added. A stress division may not be used in combination with the 'window system.' Dean seconded. Carried 5-4.
4. Paul moved to change rule II B 1 to read". . The maximum riding speed shall average 5.5 to 8 miles per hour with minimum ride time to be 3 hours, 7 1/2 minutes."
5. Mike moved that the following sentence be added to Article VII, Section 3 of the By-laws: "Ride managers are not eligible to be elected as rider representatives." Dean seconded. Motion carried.

A suggestion was received to the effect that "proxy voters" not be eligible for any elected position on the Board of Directors. Mike moved that this matter be tabled and that the issue of who is ride management, who is considered a proxy and who should vote should be addressed either by the Board or a committee appointed by the Board. Tom seconded. Motion carried.

Mike moved to table the suggestion that the Newsletter Editor be given a vote at the annual meeting. Motion seconded and carried.

Rick moved to adjourn the meeting.

\section*{board meeting}

The Board of Directors were convened Saturday morning, January 31, 1987 at the Ramada Inn, Janesville, Wisconsin. Present were Art Priesz, Louise Riedel, Tom Pickard, Marsha Achenbach, Mike Thomas; Paul Heberling, Rick Nelson, and Dr. R.A.Beecher, directors; Guy Worthington, Ray Gehrig and Dale Scott, rider representatives. Rick moved, Ray seconded to approve the minutes of the December 6 board meeting as printed and circulated. Motion carried.

Mike reported that he is working on a directory of veterinarians who have been or are interested in serving in a ride capacity. Paul stated that the awards are in readiness to be presented following the banquet.

In regard to the apparent contradiction between AERC and UMECRA rules concerning disqualification of treated horses, a letter received from the AERC rules committee chairman contained clarification to the effect that although a horse cannot be disqualified following the final one-hour vet check for veterinary reasons, it can be disqualified if it has received medication in violation of UMECRA rule I C 7 (that a horse may not have required or received medication for metabolic reasons before leaving the grounds.)

Rick moved to correct the statement in the minutes of the December board meeting concerning the change in p/r parameters on the score sheet. The sheet should read "three points will be deducted for each four hearbeats and two points will be deducted for each four breaths." Motion carried. On the bottom half of the score sheet Rick moved and Mike seconded to delete the 40 point penalty for muscle soreness as a general category and to assign the following penalty points to sub-topics under that category: back - 10 points; shoulder - 10 points; other - 10 points. Motion carried.

Marsha moved to accept the Newsletter financial statement as presented by Elinore Tonsor. Ray seconded. Motion carried. Ray moved, Paul seconded to approve the UMECRA statement. (Copies appended)

Rick moved to present a proposal to the general meeting to amend Section VII 1 a of the by-laws to read "All persons shall be eligible for an individual membership." (This deletes the requirement that a person must be 18 years or older for membership). Tom seconded. Motion carried.

Dale moved and Ray seconded to eliminate the "To Finish is To Win" award. (This is due to the lack of input necessary to name a winner of this award.) Motion carried.

A question was raised concerning Norm Cooper's proposed 100 mile two-day competitive ride which will take place on Friday and Sunday, leaving the horses inactive on Saturday. If that horse's rider were entered in Saturday's endurance ride, would it be permissible for someone else to walk the competitive horse that day? (This is in opposition of the competitive rule that riders are required to care for their own mounts during the competition.) After much discussion it was the consensus that the statement in Rule II C 1 (assistance in the care and grooming of mounts is prohibited unless the ride comittee determines that assistance is needed) would cover the situation.

The next item of business was acceptance of the 1987 ride schedule. There
was objection to the fact that the ApDRA and Palisades Rides had three other rides on the weekends they were scheduled for. Dale moved and Dr. Beecher seconded to accept the proposed schedule. Art offered a friendly amendment to the effect that AHAM, Maplewood, and White River Summer rides not be "grandfathered in" for the 1988 season. Dale and Dr. Beecher accepted the friendly amendment. Motion carried. (It was the consensus that these three rides be allowed first choice on available dates in 1988.) Dr. Beecher moved and Rick seconded that the current year's schedule be the precedent for the succeeding year. New rides will be given priority in order of application. A change in a ride date will constitute that ride as a new ride. The Board will attempt to limit the number of rides to three per week-end.

The meeting was adjourned.

\section*{general meeting}

The meeting was called to order at li30. The following rides responded to roll-call: KMAHA, St. Jude, Equine Research, Grand Island I, Glacier Trails, Hayward, Wolf Creek, AHDRA I, ApDRA, Keweenaw, SE Minnesota II, Grand Island II, Wildeat Mountain, AHDRA II, Minnesota River Valley, Minn-I-Kota, Bear Down, Charity CuOp, Palisades, Kettle Moraine, One Tuff Nut, SAHARA, Mt. Valhalla, Jubilee, Effingham Crossroads, Michibay,Maplewood, Hennepin County, Milwauke River, Son of a Ditch. Sixty-two were entitled to vote.

Dr Beecher moved, Fred Kuhn seconded to accept the minutes of the last annual meeting as circulated. The financial reports of the general treasury and the Newsletter account, which were accepted by the Board, were presented.

Art Priesz, president, presented the agenda for the meeting's business. Committee reports followed: Mike Thomas spoke about preparing a directory of ride veterinarians. There was no committee report on the plan to produce a video to be used for instructive purposes.

Art explained the changes that the Board had made to the score sheet. The zero point for pulse/respiration on competitive rides has been changed from \(24 / 4\) to \(36 / 8\). For every 4 pulse beats per minute, 3 points will be lost. For every 4 respirations, 2 points will be lost. Points lost on the bottom of the sheet for such items as muscle soreness, lameness, fatigue etc were not changed, but were defined more clearly. Elinore Tonsor protested the Board's decision to change the score sheet without seeking the approval and endorsement of ride management and the general membership. Art pointed out that no rules which require general action were involved and also that the By-laws give the Board authority to implement matters of this sort.

The AERC opinion concerning differences in rulings concerning disqualified horses was presented. (See minutes of Board meeting)

Louise presented a report on AERC programs, especially pertaining to the International competition to be held in September.

The ride schedule was presented and the action of the Board in setting guidelines for scheduling in the future was announced. (See Board minutes)

Diane Kuhn moved to amend Rule II B 8 to read "There must be a minimum of one rest stop during each 25 miles or increments over 15 miles thereof. (For example a ride must be 40 miles or over in order to require two rest stops)" Fred Kuhn seconded. Motion carried.

There was no motion presented for the rule proposed at the December Board meeting concerning the rider touching the horse during a vet check.

Louise moved that the following proposed rule change be put on the agenda for the annual meeting:

Rule III \(\mathbb{H} 1\) (concerning "Stop and Go" rides)shall be changed to read "A rider entering a vet check may present his horse for a \(\mathrm{p} / \mathrm{r}\) reading at any time within 20 minutes. If the horse fails to pass, the rider may not ask for another check before 10 minutes. However the horse must pass within a total of 20 minutes or be disqualified."
Lindsay seconded. Kotion carried.
It was the consensus of the Board that UFTCRA should join the Minnesota and Wisconsin Horse Councils.

Jan proposed that an award be established for the "best ride of the season" as determined by rider vote at the annual meeting. ivo action was taken.

Lindsay moved that the following proposed rule change be put on the agenda for the annual meeting: (Change underlined)

Rule II C 5 be chanced to read, "Natural water only is allowed on the trail. Drinking water only is allowed at rest stops. A horse shall not be denied drinking water at any time at a vet check. . . . .
Paul seconded. Notion carried.
A recommendation that each ride should have one vote at the annual meeting was presented. Dr Beecher moved, it was seconded and carried to deny this proposal.

A recommendation was presented to develop a system of proxy votes. Dr. Beecher moved, JoAnne seconded to deny the use of proxy votes. Notion carried. (Both this and the previous proposal would necessitate changes in the by-laws)

JoAnne moved that the following proposed rule change be put on the agenda for the annual meeting: (Change underlined)

To change Rules II B 2 and III A to read "There shall be two weight divisions as follows . . . Heavyweight - 190 pounds and over. . . Lindsay seconded. The vote resulted in a 3-3 tie. It will be added to the agenda.

Marsha moved that the following proposed rule change be put on the agenda for the annual meeting:

To be added to rules II 32 and Rule III A "All heavyweight riders must be weighed prior to the ride."
Lindsay seconded. Motion carried 5-1.
Lindsay moved that the following proposed rule change be put on the agenda for the annual meeting. (Change underlined)

To change Rule I C 3 to read . . . "pulse of \(\underline{68}\), respiration of 68." Jan seconded. Motion carried.

JoAnne moved that a year-end "family award" be established. She was appointed to draw up guidelines to be considered at the Doa, rd meeting precedire the annual meeting. Motion seconded and carried.

A proposal was received that the annual meeting should be conducted adcording to Roberts Rules of Order. JoAnne moved that we not adhere strictly to Roberts Rules of Order because of the short tine availenle +o conduct a sizeable amount of business. Lindsay seconded. Notion carried.

A proposal was made that to be eligible for the Rookie of the Year award a person may be allowed to participate in two rides prior to the current year. Dr. Beecher moved and Jan seconded to leave the award as present\(l y\) described (not to have participated in an open ride prior to the current year.)

The final item of business was the 1985 schedule.


Ray Gehrig moved that the Stress Division be reinstated. JoAnne Gernant seconded. Dianne Kuhn proposed a friendly amendment that stress riders start 12.5\% later than the regular riders. The maker and 5 econder of the original motion refused it. Dianne then moved to amend the original motion to the effect that stress riders start 12.5\% later than the regular riders. Fred Kuhn seconded. Amendment passed. The original motion as amended defeated.

Bob Wadzinski moved to change rule II B 1 to read "The maximum riding speed shall average 5.5 to 8 miles per hour with minimum ride time to be 3 hours 7 1/2 minutes." JoAnne Gernant seconded. Motion defeated.

Elinore Tonsor moved, Romona Radtke seconded that Article VII, Section 3 of the By-Laws be amended to read "Ride managers are not eligible to be elected as rider representatives." Motion carried by a two-thirds majority.

Elinore Tonsor moved, Romona Radtke seconded that "If a motion check is to be held at a vet stop, the rider shall be allowed up to departure time to present his horse." Motion defeated.

Elinore Tonsor moved, Romona Radtke seconded that "After the ride brochures are published and ride dates accepted by the board, the schedule shall be frozen. Rides shall not be allowed to change dates or be added to the schedule." Motion defeated.

There was no motion for the proposal presented at the December Board meeting that "The mandatory 20 -minute hold, endurance stop and go, could be reduced at the end of the season to 10 or 15 minutes"

Fred Kuhn moved, Anne Ness seconded that "Completion and mileage bbut not placing) shall be allowed for a horse that may need metabolic treatment after one hour following ride time." Sally Worthington proposed a friendly amendment to the effect that Rule 1 C 7 b shall read " Have not required and/ or received medication for metabolic reasons before leaving the grounds, (to include colic, tying up, thumps, etc.) Except mileage, but not placing, shall be allowed for a horse that needs or receives metabolic treatment after the final one-hour check." The friendly amendment was acceptable to Anne and Fred. Motion carried.

Dale Scott moved to amend Section VII 1 a to read "All persons shall be eligible for an individual membership." "This deletes the qualification for membership of "eighteen years of age or older." Seconded by Rick Nelson. Motion carried by a two-thirds majority.

Proposals were presented by Sara Davis and Jill Morris to institute a new type of ride that would be run same day as endurance, would be 25 miles, would have no weight divisions, no individual ride placings, no year-end awards, riders eligible to accrue mileage, no point standings, one vet check within one mile of the finish, must meet p/r parameters and be sound at the walk, maximum ride time of 8 hours. The proposal failed for lack of a motion.

The next order of business was election of officers. Rick Nelson nominated Art Priesz for president. There being no further nominations, Art Priesz was elected by acclamation. Dr. Beecher was nominated for vice-president. There being no further nominations he was elected by acclamation. Louise Riedel was nominated for secretary-treasurer. There being no further nominations she was elected by acclamation. The following people were nominated for Directors at large: Elinore Tonsor, Guy Worthington, Bonnie Kaufman, Dale Scott, Dianne Kuhn, Jan Worthington, Dee Mielke, Marsha Achenbach, Mike Thomas and Rick Nelson. Elected were Guy, Dale, Jan, and Marsha The meeting was adjourned.

## 1987

The UMECRA Board of Directors met December 5 in Dubuque, Iowa. Present were Art Priesz, Dr. R. A. Beecher, Louise Riedel, Marsha Achenbach, Ray Gehrig, Paul Heberling, Jan Worthington and Guy Worthington.

Art reported that high point and limited distance awards have been taken care of.

The annual banquet will be held at the Ramada Inn in Rochester, January 30. The deadline for making room reservations has been extended to Janauary 15. A sit-down meal consisting of three choices of meat was chosen. A reservation form will be included in the Newsletter which will enable individuals to choose their preferred entree. The cost of the banquet will be $\$ 13.50$, to include tax, tip and entertainment following the dinner.

Pursuant to the results of the Newsletter questionnaire it was decided to hold a Ride Manager's meeting at 10 a.m. Saturday.

The schedule of the weekend's events are as follows:

Joe Mattingley would like to donate a "pitcrew of the year" award--to be decided by vote at the annual meeting. Only whose who have placed top ten or limited distance to be eligible to vote, with one vote per placing. Dr. Beecher moved, Paul seconded to approve this award. Motion carried.

A recommendation has been received to the effect that a location central to the Midwest ride region be determined, and that the meeting be held there every year. After discussion it was the suggestion of the Board that the banquet be rotated over a three-year period in or near the following locations in Wisconsin: LaCrosse; Fond-du-Lac or Green Bay; Madison-Janesville (or Rockford IL). No action was taken.

The next order of business was consideration of two protests:

1. Rhonda Williams protests concerning the St. Jude Ride. Dr. Beecher moved, Ray seconded to deny the protest on the following grounds. In reviewing the evidence and circumstances it is the opinion of the Board that (1) there was evidence that she missed part of the trail (2) there was evidence that she was notified to redo part of the trail, which she refused to do. The Board feels that ride management could have better handled the method of notifying her of disqualification.
2. Protest of Jackie Strong against the Yankee Springs ride on the grounds that a spot check on the competitive ride was held within the two-mile marker, resulting in a time penalty which might have deprived her of a higher placing. Ride management explained that this situation occurred because the spot-check personnel by mistake found the junction
to the trail within the two-mile marker (this without the knowlege or approval of ride management). It was the consensus of the board that although there was an infraction of the rules, there could be no action to change the results of the ride. Dr Beecher moved that we uphold the protest, return the $\$ 25$, and suggest that ride management take care to avoid a like situation. Motion seconded and carried.

Dr: Beecher moved and Paul Heberling seconded to add the following to the rules; I D 8 -"It is the rider's responsibility to present himself to the veterinarian (or p/r crew) precisely at the time indicated on the time card. Motion carried."

Dr. Beecher moved, Paul seconded to change rule 1 C 2 to read "Normal criteria for advancement - pulse of 68 ; respiration of 68 . These criteria must be met at all regularly scheduled vet checks within 20 minutes."

Dr. Beecher moved, Guy Worthington seconded to change rule I D 7 to read "Official competitors may not be accompanied by horses and riders that have not entered the ride." Motion carried.

A suggestion had been received to the effect that competitive horses be trotted out first (at the time specified for the final check), and then sent back into line for evaluation of heat, filling, pain, abrasions etc. This will be added to the Ride Manager's Manual under General Suggestions as IV E 3 (c).

A recommendation had been received relative to changing our present point system to give more credit to finishing in proportion to winning or placing. Ray Gehrig moved, Marsha seconded to change the system to give one point for completion and one-half point for each increment of placing. SFirst place - 3 pts; 2nd place - 2.5 pts; 3d place - 2 pts; 4th place - 1.5 pts; 5th place - 1.0 pts; completion - 1 pt. $)$ Motion carried. GQplece, -.5

Discussion followed on the use of the UMECRA score sheets for endurance rides. There is a difference between our sheets and the AERC bestcondition sheets and if the veterinarians choose to transcribe information from our sheet to AERC's, the best condition data is not complete. It was decided to refer this matter to the Ride Manager's meeting for their recommendations.

A recommendation had been received to the effect that a system should be implemented whereby ride management could file a protest against a rider for abusive conduct. After lengthy discussion Art moved and Marsha seconded to table this matter until the board meeting preceding the annual meeting. Motion carried.

A letter was received requesting that the age of junior competitive riders be raised to 18. Jan moved, Ray seconded to present this matter at the annual meeting. Motion carried.

A suggestion was received that as ongoing recognition the champion and reserve champion horse in each division will carry the following numbers during the next ride season: Competitive: 1CL; 1CH; 1CJ; 2CL; 2 CH ; 2CJ. Endurance; 1EL, etc. No action was taken.

Following are AERC rules that differ from UMECRA rules. Ray moved that they be presented at the annual meeting. Motion seconded. Carried.

4．ENTRY TO A RIDE CANNOT BE REFUSED EXCEPT FOR CAUSE
4．1 Cause is defined as a specific occurrence substantiated by direct and corroborated evidence of one of the following －Non－payment of ride fees，such as an insufficient funds check not made good
－Abuse of a forse，such as drugging or continuing to ride after be－ ing pulled without the specific permission of a ride vet
－Abusive harassment of ride personnel，other riders or crews，such as arguing with the veterinarians，breaking the line at vet gates or deliberately blocking other riders on the trail
－Removing or altering trail markers
－Cheating，such as deliberate short cuts or deliberately leaving timed holds early
6．COMPLETION REQUIRES MEETING ALL OF THE FOLLOWING CRITERIA
a．All riders and mounts must be present and accounted for at the start of the ride．
6．1 An entry must pass all veterinary criteria for completion．A rider who fails any of the other criteria should be pulled from top ten placing，but may be allowed a completion，if in the opinion of ride management，the viola－ tion was not intentional and did not result in making the course easier or shorter．

8．5．＊．Riders shall be weighed at their first ride of the season and may be spot checked at any or all subsequent rides．Any rider may challenge a rider＇s weight．

The meeting was called to order by Art friesz, ather members present were Dr. Feecher, Louise Riedel, Jan Worthington, Guy worthington, Faul Heberling, Dale Scott, Marsha Achentach and rider representatives Ray Gehrig, Jaanne Gernant and Leonard Rounds.

Elinore Tonsor presented an idea for year-end awards by which a plaque would be designed ta display a number of plates for the current and follawing years. This wauld eliminate the necessity of finding different awards year after year. It was decided to present this idea at the general meeting to ascertain the feeling of the membership and also the poll the members through the Newsletter as well as to solicit opinions during the first part of the seasan.

Under old business there was a discussion of the changes in the rules as proposed at the December baerd meeting. There were no suggested alterations.

The proposed change in the point system for determing year-end awards was discussed. A handout was distributed showing the effect on the 1787 HW endurance standings of three alternatives to the present system. Fay moved and Louise seconded to substitute the following for the system adopted at the December board meeting: 1 point for every five miles plus the present points for placings, <an a $25-m i l e$ ride this would amount to 11 points for first, 10 for $2 \pi d, 9$ for $3 r d, 8$ for 4th, 7 for $5 t h, 6$ for bth and 5 for completion) foints would be pro-rated for longer distances. This proposal will be presented at the general meeting. Motion carried.

The question of ride management being able to protest the unsportsmanlike conduct of riders, which had been tabled at the December board meeting was addressed. Dr. Beecher moved and Jan seconded that the following be added to the agenda for the general meeting: A section shall be added to the Ride Manager's manual suggesting that a Steward (who shall be a non-rider) be appointed. This person will interpret the rules and adjudicate disputes between management and riders. Motion carried.

The difference between AERC and UMECRA endurance rules was discussed, It was suggested that it be specified in the ride booklets which rules originate with AERC. Dr. Feecher moved that any changes made at the AERC convention can be reflected in our rule books. Seconded and carried.

A proposal had been received that we add a middleweight division. Louise moved that this be added to the agenda for the general meeting. Dr. Eeecher seconded. Carried.

Guy Worthington moved to recommend to the general meeting that the limited distance competitive division be extended by 50 miles and the limited distance endurance division by 100 miles. Dr. Eeecher seconded. Motion carried.

Jan Worthington suggested that the number of Epot checks on competitive rides be announced. There was no motion.

A letter had been received that the high scoring horse on competitive rides should receive one extra point for a $25-m i l e$ ride, to be prorated for longer distances. No action was taken.

Guy Worthington moved that all endurance rides be required to use the gate into a hold (modified stop \& gol system on endurance rides, and that the traditional mandatary hold system be eliminated. Dr. Eeecher seconded. Motion carried. This proposal will te presented to the general meeting.

The meeting was adjourned.

General Meeting, January 301988
The meeting was called to order at $1: 20$ p.m. Fides present were: SE Minnesota I, KMAHA, Grand Island I, Glacjer Trails, Effingham Crossroads II, St Jude, Effingham Crossroads I, Fillsbury Research, Heyward 01d Smoothie, Maplewood, AHDFA I, ApDFA, Grand Island II, Wilucat Mountaing Bear Downs SE Minnesota II; AHDRA IIs Minn-I-Kota, MnDRA, AHAM, Fillager Cup, Charity Cup, Falisades, Kettle Moraine; One Tuff Nut, Jubilee, Illini, MnDRA II, Son of a Ditch; Mt. Valhalla, White River Fall ride, Milwaukee Fiver, Point Chaser, Sixty-two votes were authorized.

Fot Wadzinski moved, Dr. Eeecher seconded to accept the minutes of the 1987 general meeting as published. Motion carried. Bob Wadzinski moved, Dr. Beecher seconded to accept the financial report as distributed. Motion carried. SFinancial report attached to these minutes).

Under commmitee reports the president announced that the fide ManagerVeterinary Handbook has been reorganized in response to complaints that it was hard to find pertinent information in the old one. The endurance scoresheet was discussed at the Ride Manager's forum. Sally Worthington reported that a committee was formed to make revisions to better accomodate the present score sheet to endurance rides.

The proposal discussed at the Foard meeting to formulate a permanent type year-end award was explained. A show of hands resulted in members indicating a preference for the present system of different awards to be given each year. More discussion and opinion will be solicited.

Louise fiedel reported for $A E R C$, primarily concerning the new National Championship system whereby the best five 50 mile rides and the best 100 mile rides count, with two rides teing held in each of the eight $A E R C$ regions. The $A E F C$ committee assigned dates for these rides in
each region, the Midwest dates being September 17 for the fifty mile ride and September 24 for the 100 . The FEI World Championship International Ride will also be held September 24, and nominations should tee sent to either the AERC office or Lee wittle. Jan announced that she has been delegated to secure lease horses for use of the European riders for this ride. Anyone interested in leasing a horse for this purpose should contact Jan Worthington.

Differences between AERC and UMECRA rules were discussed. The president explained that UMECRA, in order to achieve sanctioning, must follow AERC rules, and can change those rules only by being stricter, The protlem mainly concerns the AERC junior rule--we do not have the option of liberalizing that rule. We either adopt the stance that UMECRA will follow the rule or decline to have AERC sanctioning and lose endurance riders. There is a possibility that the phrase in the AERC rules that provides that "juniors 14 and over with 500 miles shall ride in the senior division" will be deleted. Mike Thomas moved that UMECFA ride managers unanimously agree that they in advance deny permission to riders 16 and under to ride as seniors; and that sponsor ship of a junior be designated by the physical exchange of a token of some kind with the senior sponsors who have signed up prior to the ride as ad-hoc sponsors. . Management must be notified of the change of sponsors at the earliest possible opportunity. Motion died for lack of a second.

Steve Hanson moved that we forget atout AERC sanctioning. Jim Donaghue seconded. Motion defeated.

JoAnne Gernant moved that we accept the junior rule as proposed by AERC. Motion seconded and carried.
 December board meeting that the following be added as a suggestion to the Ride Manager's manual "Competitive horses shall be trotted out first (at the time specified for the final check) and then sent back intoline for evaluation of heat, filling, pain, atrasions, etc, There were no objections.

The next item of old business concerned the proposal that ride management be enabled to protest against a rider for abusive conduct. This matter was tabled at the December board meeting. Dr. Feecher suggested that the following be incorporated into the fide Manager's manual as a suggestion: that rides be allowed to use a steward as per minutes of the preceding Foard meeting,

Elinore moved, Dr, Beecher seconded that the following be added to the rules: I D 8 - "It is the rider's resposnsibility to present himself to the veterinarian (or p/r crew) precisely at the time indicated on the time card. Motion carried.

Dr. Eeecher moved, Bob Wadzinski seconded to change Rule I 22 to read "Official competitors may not be accompanied by horses and riders that have not entered the ride." Motion carried.

Dr. Eeecher moved; Suzette Riches seconded to change fule i $C 2$ ta read "Normal criteria for advancement - pulse of 68; respiration of 68. These criteria must be met at all regularly scheduled vet checks within 20 minutes." Motion carried.

Suzette Riches maved; Dee Mielke seconded ta change the age of competitive juniors to 18. Motion carried.

The revised point system as adopted at the December board meeting was modified at the Foard meeting this morning. See minutes of that preceding meeting. Anne Ness moved, Mary Smith moved to adopt this revised system. Motion carried.

Dr Eeecher moved, JuAnme seconded that the allowatle mileages for limited distance be increased by 50 miles for competitive and 100 miles for competitive. Motion carried. (Note: This motion was sutsequently reqpened and revised. See belaw)

Fot Wadzinski moved and Dr Eeecher seconded that a middleweight division be added. The mation was defeated.

Dr. Beecher moved; Sally Worthington seconded to mandate the use of gate into a hold \{modified stop and go on all endurance rides) Motion defeated.

Sally worthington moved that under the mandatory hold systemif the horse daes nat pass the vet check in 10 minutes, he may be presented any time thereafter for a recheck, but the horse will not be allawed to leave the vet check until 20 minutes have elapsed after he passes. Guy Worthington seconded. Motion defeated.

Sharon Crysler moved that the question concerning limited distance be reopened on the grounds that with the increase of mileage for endurance, the last six of the top ten would then become the winners of the limited distance division. Motion seconded and carried. JoAnne moved and Sharon seconded that limited distance be changed to increase competitive 50, miles, but leave endurance as it is. Motion seconded. Guy made a friendly amendment to the effect that riders in the top ten not be eligitle for limited distance, and that a rider who would be eligible for both awards must make the decision as to which he prefers. JoAnne seconded the friendly amendment. Motion to add the friendly amendment to the original motion carried. The entire motion carried.

A suggestion was discussed at the board meeting that the high scoring horse of a competitive ride receive one additional point per each 25 miles. No action was taken at this time; but the concept will be considered in the future.

In consideration of the 1988 ride schedule, it was requested that the AHDFA II ride be scheduled on June $18 ; 19$, a date that had already been filled. Dr. Beecher moved and Dee Mielke seconded that the schedUle as proposed be accepted with the stipulation that the board would attempt to find another date for the AHDRA ride.

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Rider representatives JoAnne Gernant, Kathy Love, Leonard Rounds and
Marsha Achentach were installed.
The next item of business was election of officers. Nominated for
president were Art Friesz, Fay Gehrig and Dee Mielke. Art Friesz was
elected, Nominated for vice-president were Dr, Feecher, Fred Kuhn,
Dee Mielke and Fay Gehrig. Ray Gehrig declined. Dee Mielke was
elected. Lauise Riedel was elected secretary-treasurer by acclamation.
Nominated for Board of Directors were Dr. Beecher, Ray Gehrig, Elinore
Tonsor, Jan Worthington, Guy Worthington, Fred Kuhn, Leonard Founds.
Elected were Dr. Beecher, Ray Gehrig, Leonard Rounds and Guy Worthing-
ton. Nominated for veterinary refresentative were fobin Lawrence,

## GOARD OF DIFECTORS MEETING <br> December 3, 1988

The Board of Directors met at the home of Fred and Dianne Kuhn, Rochester, MN. In attendance were Art Friesz, Dee Mielke, Ray Gehrig, Dr. Feecher, Guy Worthington, Louise Riedel, Faul Heberling, Leonard Rounds, and kathy Love. Dr. Feecher moved to dispense with reading of the minutes.

Art reported that top ten awards have been ordered, and that limited distance awards will be taken care of. The agenda for the annual meeting was set as follows for Saturday, January 28:

Board meeting - 7:30 a.m.
Fresentation by Dr. Dane Frazer - 10:00 a.m. General Meeting - 1:00 p.m.
Cocktail Hour = $5: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.
Dinner - 6:30 p.m.
AHDFA and ApDFA meetings will be held Sunday morning, times to be announced.
Copies of the tentative 1989 schedule were distrituted. Lauise announced that under the new AEFC championship system, competitors will ride in their own regions until August. At that time the top $20 \%$ of riders in each region will become eligible to participate in z national championship rides.
Tentative plans call for the first to be held in 4 regions on September 16 , the second in 4 more regions on October 7 ; and the final on October 28 in the Central Fegion. As of now the Midwest region is sctieduled to put on a so- 100 mile ride on oictaber 7 ; however AEFE has indicated that we might be able to change to the previous date (Sept. 16). AERC will be contacted for mare sperific details before this ride is scheduled.

Art presented a proposal for liatility insurance caverage for all umecha rides. This coverage could be provided for each ride by assessing an eytra - dollar per entrant fee. IIf the DNA required extra coverage, there wauld he an additional feel. Dr. Feecher moved that this proposal be presented at the anmual meeting with the recommendation that it be accepted. Kay seconded. Mation carried.

A recommendation has been received to the effect that no rides start fefore daylight. Leonard moved that a suggestion be included in the fide Managers Mannual stating that $50-m i l e$ or less endurance or competitive rides shauld not start before daybreak. Dee seconded. Motion carried.

Dee presented a proposal she had received to the effect that a new division be instituted called the short-distance open-division. This would be a loI5 mile ride with ra weight divisjons, and would te appropriate for yaung horses or horses recovering from injuries. It would attract more new and local riders. There would te no year end awards involved, but mileage would be counted. Dr. Beectier moved to table this proposal. Guy secanded. Motion carried.

Anne Ness had summitted a request for approval for the AEFC Limited distance program. Dr. Feecher moved that a letter be written from the Board stating that at this time we do not wish to sanction $25-m i l e$ endurance rides, that they are presently being tried at AERC rides and we feel that there needs ta be more information gatfered before we can safely sanction them. Leonard secanded. Motion carried.

Dee presented a proposal she had received asking the Foard to consider Expanding the fookie of the Year award to be a top-five navice program. Ray moved to tabie, Dr. Beectier seconded. Motion carried.

Guy moved that the warding to descrite the Rookie of the Year award be changed to read "Awarded in both endurance and competitive to the senior riders with the most paints of those riders who have not competed in open rides previous to the current year. This shall be limited to a one rider-one horse combination in each division. Fay seconded. Motion carried.

Kathy moved, Dee seconded to change the wording describing High Foint Awards to read... Places will be given through loth to those who have 40 points or more competitive and 60 or more endurance. (Formerly 20 and 40)
Art moved and fay seconded to add the following (section in boldface) to Rule I C 2. "Normal criteria for advancement are a pulse of 68 and a respiration of 68. These criteria must be met at all regularly scheduled vet checks, and on a competitive ride the pulse criteria must be met within 20 minutes at the final check in order qualify for completion and placing.

Louise maved, Kathy seconded to re-number Rule III D--to become Rule I D 9. This moves the rule concerning entrants being present and accounted for at the start of a ride from the Endurance Rule Section to the General Rules. Motion carried.

- Dr. Feecher moved to present to the general meeting an amendment to Fule $I \quad 3$ to read "Entrants must follow the prescribed course, do multiple loops in the correct order, and pass all control points. A competitor who fails this criteria should be pulled from placing but may be allowed a completion, if in the opinion of ride management the violation was not intentional and did not result in making the course easier or shorter. However if the rider wishes to compete for placing then he must go back to the point of departure and must complete the entire trail in its correct order." Guy seconded. Motion carried.

Requests have been received from the AHAM Fide to adopt the elevatar system as outlined in AERC rules for their $2-d a y ~ 100-m i l e$ endurance ride and $2-d a y$ 75 mile competitive ride. A request was also received to adopt this system for the Glacier Trails 2-day 75-mile competitive ride. Art maved and Lauise seconded to grant approval for this concept.
A suggestion had been received that ride management announces how many spot checks will be used, and that time held in spot checks should mot be included in ride time. Dr. Beecher maved ta present to the general meetiño an addition to fiule II I c. to read "The number of spot checks shall be limited to two per day." Guy seconded. Mation carried.

A suggestion had teen recejved that extra points be awarded to the competitive horse with the overall high score as is done for best condition in endurance. Faul moved that the following be deleted from the description
$\eta$ of scaring for high point awards "... plus 2 additional points for best condition on a $50-m i l e$ ride, 4 on a 100 miler ." (The best condition award will still be given at rides, but no year-end points wald be awarded). Motion seconded and carried.

A suggestion had teen received that weigh-ins should not be done the night before the ride, that the weigh-in before the ride should be entered on the best condition sheet, and that each rider should ride in his appropriate Weight division. Faul moved and Leonard seconded that an amendment to Rules II A B 2 and IIIA be presented to the general meeting to read"...All riders - must be weighed with tack pre-ride and shall ride in their respective weight divisions." Motion carried.

A proposal had been made to the effect that a 5 or 10 minute hold check shall be used, to be decided by ride managers. Leonard pointed out that although horses continue ta recover for the 10 minute period, they drope the most rafidly during the first minutes. If we go to a s-minute check, it becomes imperative that the horses te checked exactly at 5 minutes. If there a number of horses in line, it would be almost impossible far all of them to be checked at exactly minutes, which gives the end forses more of an advantage under a 5 -minute hald than under a 10 -minute hold. Ray maved, Lauise

- seconded that this suggestion te presented at the annual meeting without the Foard's recommendation. Mation defeated. Guy moved and Leanard seconded that it be presented with the Buard's recommendation that it NOT be passed. Mation carried.

Leanard moved, Dee seconded that the following be included as a suggestion in the Fide Manager's Manual: that persons taking p/r's not take readings on horses belonging to members of their families.

A suggestion had been received that UMECRA should not sanction any ride which is also sanctioned by another distance riding organization which is geagraphically eyclusive within the UMECRA region in its sanctioning of rides or awarding of points. Further, no person who telongs to such a geggraphically exclusive arganization can serve as a UMECRA officer or on the
 meeting with the recommendation that it not be passed. Dee seconded. Motion defeated.

Dr. Heecher moved to adjourn.

Dr. Beecher moved, Fred Kuhn seconded to add the following to Rule II D C The number of spot checks shall be lisited to two per day." Motion defeated unanimously.

Wendy Thiede moved, Mike Thomas seconded to add a short-distance open ride to the competitive division. Motion defeated.

At the December Board meeting a proposal had been considered that a 5 or 10 minute hold check be used at spot checks. The Board voted that the matter be presented at the annual meeting with the Board's recommendation that it not be passed. There being no motion from the floor, the matter was or opped.

The subject of UMECRA obtaining a blanket insurance policy was presented. Rick Nelson moved that UMECRA provide optional insurance with fees to be prorrated among rides that apply. Motion seconded and carried.

The next order of business was election of officers. Nominated for president were Art Priesz; JoAnne Gernant, declined; Ray Gehrig, declined; Jan Worthington. Art was elected. Nominated for Vice President were Dee Mielke and Guy Worthington. Dee was elected. Louise Riedel was nominated for Secretary and elected by acclamation. Nominated for Board members at large were Leonard Rounds, Dr. Beecher, Joe Yogus, Mark Jensen, Ray Gehrig, Connie Gray, Wendy Thiede, Monna Radtke, Wayne McVeigh and Guy Worthington. Elected were Leonard Rdounds, Dr. Beecher, Ray Gehrig and Guy Worthington. Nominated for Veterinary Representative were Randy Schuett, Sharon Kiehm,
Vic Cortese and Wel Elford. Sharon Kiehm was elected.

The Board of Directors met at the home of Fred and Dianne Kuhn. Those present were Art Priesz, Dr. Eeecher Ray Gehrig, Paul Heberling, Louise Riedel, Dr. Kiehm, Leonard Rounds; and Connie Gray.

Louise Riedel moved to accept the minutes of the last meeting as circulated. Motion seconded and carried. There was no old business.

The first item of new business was consideration of a suggestion that Rule I C 2 be changed to read "to be eligible for placing, a (competitive) horse must meet normal criteria for advancement of $68 / 68$ within 20 minutes of the final vet check; otherwise it will be eligible for completion and mileage only." Dr. Beecher moved Ray Gehrig seconded to consider the suggestion. It was pointed out that granting completion in such a case would result in the horserider team receiving at least 5 points (or as many as 20). Dr. Beecher moved to amend the motion to read "If the horse fails the finishing pulse requirement, the only award he will be eligible for is mileage," Louise seconded. After lengthy discussion, Dr. Beecher withdrew the motion to amend. Rule I C 2 will stand as presently written.

A suggestion had been received that the following be added to Rule IC 7 E for competitive: "Horses that are Grade IlI and above are not eligible for placing, only completion and mileage." This subject had been discussed along with the previous proposal--it was the consensus of the board that this rule ("Not lame at a walk" as a completion criterial should remain the same.

A request had been received that the language of II B 1 a, concerning the window system be changed. It was moved and seconded that this rule be clarified to read: "A rider may come in from 5 minutes before or up to 5 minutes after the exact scheduled time without losing points. one point per minute is lost for coming in before or after these dimits up to 55 minutes (a total of 55 points) without being disqualified." Motion carried.

The folllowing suggestion had been received. "Monetary awards cannot be given for competitive and endurance ride placings in a UMECRA sanctioned ride or at a ride that is held in conjunction with a UMECRA sanctioned, the only exception being the Arabian horse sweepstakes if a UMECRA approved steward is hired." There was no motion regarding this proposal, therefore no action will be taken.

It was suggested in light of the fact that there has been very little interest in nominating rider representatives, the nomination and election of rider reps should be held at the annual meeting, effective this year. There was no motion regarding this proposal--the system will stand as is.

A proposil was received as follows: To add a provision to become Rule I 8 (Veterinary Requirements). Horses must be under veterinary supervision throughout the duration of the event, which would allow for the use of Lay Judges for the judging of endurance and competitive rides. Louise moved, Dr. Beecher seconded to present the following proposal at the general meeting.

Rule $I$ B 6 - A ride may use a lay judge under the following circumstances:

1. A ride may use a lay judge only if the ride already has two veterinarians working the ride.
2. A person wishing to be certified as a lay judge at UMECRA sanctioned rides must apply to the UMECRA Board of Directors for this title. He or she must meet the following qualifications;
a. Be approved by the board.
b. Pass an open book test with a $95 \%$ or better score. This test would be aimed at assessing the person's knowledge of the UMECRA rules governing both endurance and competitive rides.
c. Have served as an intern lay judge under two different experienced veterinarians at two separate events, both of whom must approve the lay-judge. "experienced" would mean a veterinarian who has been the head vet at not less than five UMECRA rides.)

3．Lay judges may not pull a horse from competition without the approval of the head veterinarian．The lay judge may judge locomotion but may not score lameness．Lay judges may not score legs for pain， heat or filling．
4．In all other aspects lay judges would act just as a veterinarian． The points that they deduct would stand，just as if they were a yeterinarian judge．
5．Under no circumstances does this rule restrict family members from participating in rides．
6．Also，this rule should not restrict the use of non－veterinarian personnel for the taking of P／Rs．
7．To maintain certification as a lay judge，he or she must review the rules yearly，and wust lay－judge at least one ride every two years．
Motion carried．
It was suggested that the Veterinary Representative work with a committee to formulate a written test and a form for the certification of the lay－judge．

It was moved and seconded to present the following proposal to the general meeting：＂A Novice or Rookie Top Five＂in endurance and competitive categories shall supplement the present Rookie of the Year award．Motion carried．Ray Gehrig and Connie Gray were appointed to put this suggestion into final form．Their proposal is as follows：
＂There shall be instigated a Senior Rookie Top Five in both endurance and competitive divisions，to be implemented as follows：

1．Awards mould not necessarily have to be the same as other year－end awards．
2．Participants would be required to register with the UMECRA secretary and mark their entries at rides with an＂R＂for Rookie．
3．One horse－one rider teams to count
4．Rookies would be defined as riders who competed in not more than two open events prior to their year as a declared rookie，only open rides to count．
5．Farticipants must accrue at least 20 points in competitive and 40 points in endurance to be eligible．
6．This would replace the current Rookie of the Year award．However the present travelling trophies will be awarded to the champions in both divisions．

A proposal was received to change the current procedure for notifying UMECRA rides that there has been arule infraction at their ride to include a benign letter stating the rule infraction．This mould proyide an intermediate step before PROTEST．There was no motion－－no action will be taken．

In response to a suggestion to assure that competitive horses not be required to travel faster than the established maximum speed of 7 mph， Ray Gehriq moved and Dr，Beecher seconded Eo add Ehé 子ölowing to Rule II D 2 ＂The number of spot checks cannot require a rider to go faster than 7 mph．＂Motion carried．

In response to a suggestion received by a rider representative，Ray Gehrig moved that mon endurance rides，in both mandatory holds and gate－into－a hold there shall be one rest period of at least 30 minutes after the horse has passed the p／r．check in a 50 －mile ride and two such rest periods in a 100 －mile ride．＂Leonard seconded．Motion carried，Leonard moved，Dr．Beecher seconded that on competitive rides of more than 30 miles there should be one hold of at least 40 minutes from the time of arrival．（The above two motions will require that General Rule I B 3 be deleted；that Rule II B 2 shall be inserted to cover holds on competitive rides，with subseguent rules to be re－numbered；and that the following be added to Rule III I 2
(endurance) to read that "except in BOTH mandatory holds and gate into a hold there shall be one rest period of at least... (see motion above)

A suggestion was received that size of pens be limited--possibly to 12 $x 12$ feet. Ray moved that the following be added as a suggestion to the Ride Managers' Manual "Ride managers should take the initiative to insure that pens do not take the place of other rigs, limiting where necessary the size of the pen or use of the pen. Leonard seconded. Carried.

Dr: Beecher moved, Leonard seconded, that any error or omission in ride results as printed in the Newsletter must bereported within thirty days after the mailing of the Newsletter. Motion carried.
To be added as Rule 16 (Errors in Reporting Results).
Ray Gehrig moved, Dr. Heecher seconded toraise dues to $\$ 10$ for a single membership and \$Is for a family membership. Motion carried.

It was announced that Wayne Gastfield, manager of the White River Rides, has donated $\$ 200$ toward year end awards. The Board expressed their gratitude.

Dr. Beecher moved to delete Rule 1 C 7 a, which reads "Horses shall be certified for completion and placing if they: could be safely ridden further, are capable of going on even if at a reduced speed." He felt that this is incompatible with the finishing criteria which requires only "sound at a walk". Ray Gehrig seconded. Motion carried.
Art moved that Elinore's proposal for fund-raising to support UMECRA members who may be selected to participate in FEl events overseas be approved, Ray seconded. Motion carried.

Leonard moved, Louise seconded that Rule I A 1 be changed to read "on a ride of 30 miles or less, the horse must be at least 48 months old; on a ride over 30 miles it must be at least bo months. Motion carried.

The proposed ride schedule was presented. Dr. Beecher moved, Ray seconded to hold the schedule over until the board meeting preceding the annual meeting. Motion carried.

In the matter of the protest filed by Judy Schmid concerning her placing at the Prairie River endurance ride, Louise moved, Dr. Beecher seconded to uphold the protest. Although Judy crossed the finish line 4 th, Wendy Thiede had been awarded 4 minutes to make up for her having been held that much too long at a vet check, and accordingly was awarded 4th place. The Foard felt that (i) in actuality the rider should be responsible to ascertain that the time card is correct, (2) 0ther riders should have been notified of this change of order of participants so they could plan their strategy (3) placements should be determined by the order of finish. Motion carried. Ride results will be amended to show Judy Schmid as fourth and Wendy Thiede as fifth.

Art moved to adjourn the meeting at $b$ pm.
